Joshua's Journey

Doty Brought Harry Wells- man From Lobo to the Polls.

Charged With Having Paid \$5 for the Vote.

Thomas Tracey Describes an Impersonator's Escape.

Hugh Sharkey Performs a Re- markable Feat of Memory.

Remembers Noutly's Exact Words Eight Months Ago.

So Does Alfred Milligan and Swears to Them.

But Their Versions Do Not Exactly Agree.

Mr. Tracey Is Cornered—Says Noutly Used Offensive Remarks—But He Did Not Hear Them—Amusing Developments.

The election trial is dragging on at the court house.

This morning's session was remarkable for nothing but the second disappearance of Joshua Doty at the moment when he was wanted by Mr. Osler.

Doty, who is charged with bribing Harry Wellsman to vote for Beattie, has received \$13 in witness fees. A warrant for his arrest was taken out today, but the sheriff's officer could not locate him. Doty likewise made himself scarce at the first session of the court when wanted; but he reappeared when the court adjourned.

The time this morning was largely occupied with counsel's argument. If Mr. Aylesworth maintains the pace at which he has started, 1907 for another sitting of the court next week. He spoke nearly an hour on the Doty charge, ridiculing it as "himsy" and "trifling." Mr. Osler pointedly remarked that this could not be so, if its importance was measured by Mr. Aylesworth's prolonged attention to it.

The gratitude of every compulsory attendant at the trial is due to Mr. Osler for relieving its tedium by his wit and humor in examination. In serious argument, too, he is never tiresome. His style of address is less difficult than Mr. Aylesworth's or Mr. Helmut's, and his terse, epigrammatic way of putting things always rivets the attention. His dexterity in marshalling his arguments saves much valuable time.

Tracey, the barber. The report broke off last night in the midst of Tracey's recital of his travels with the supposed impersonator.

THE PERSONATOR ESCAPED.

Witness said he only saw the stranger get out at polling place No. 23, and then witness and Graham drove away to East London. They returned to No. 23, and Graham got the stranger into the rig again and they drove to McNell's, another polling division.

Q—And did he vote?
A—He never got that far.

Q—How far did he get?
A—He got out at Victoria Park, and I saw him running, with a constable after him.

Q—Can you swear that Noutly said after you refused him money?
A—No.

Q—You said he was offensive. How was he offensive?

"DON'T KNOW"—"CAN'T SAY."
A—I don't know.

Q—Did he act mean. How did he act?
A—I can't say.

Q—Witness then asked witness if he could show how Noutly acted. Witness said he did not pay much attention.

Judge Robertson—You paid enough attention to say just now that he made an offensive remark.

Witness said he had not spoken to Toote that night. Toote had never given him instructions to give money to anybody. He had never before seen the stranger in the rig and never since.

HUGH SHARKEY.

Hugh Sharkey, the barber, said he was a half-brother of Tracey's. He repeated Tracey's story about Noutly's request for \$5. Witness had not the money or he must have lent it to him. Noutly said "D—the luck" and went out.

SHARKEY VISITED THE ATTIC.

To Mr. Osler, witness said he was in the gymnasium the day before the election. Chalmers was the only one he remembered seeing there.

Mr. Osler asked the witness to repeat the exact words Noutly said when refused the money. Witness swore the exact words—"D—the luck, anyhow!"

Q—And you swear to those exact words?
A—Yes. (Laughter.)

Mr. Osler—Those are not the words you told me Aylesworth. Are you sure about the "anyhow?"

A—Yes. (Laughter.)

Witness said he was driving the night before the election. Some one asked him to get into a rig driven by Mr. Crawford. They stopped near Callan's brewery, but he did not go in. It was at a private house.

Q—And you don't know what you got into the rig for?
A—Yes.

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A—Yes.

With his employer's permission, he drove that evening to London with Doty. On the way in, Doty asked him to vote for Beattie. Witness said he would vote for the best man. He spent the night at Mrs. Christie's private boarding house on Richmond street north, where Doty boarded. After breakfast he was driven to the polls by Doty, and he voted. He asked Doty to drive him home or give him his railway fare. Doty said he would see witness again. Later on in the day witness was given 50 cents by Mr. John McAdam, Everyman, which paid his fare home. The 50 cents had been sent through Doty.

Wellman was rightly cross-examined by Mr. Aylesworth. He said that Mr. Edwards had not spoken to him about his vote prior to the night that Doty called. He did not consider it an insult to be offered the \$5; he thought it was very kind of them. Mr. Aylesworth could not shake witness in the main facts of his story.

ALBERT DENNIS.

Albert Dennis was allowed a seat in the box, as he was feeble and sick. Mr. Aylesworth asked to prove Doty's agency. Mr. Dennis said he was driven to the polls by Joshua Doty in Ben Nash's rig; at least, it looked like Nash's rig. He had attended to the rig two or three years before. Witness had always been a Conservative.

Wm. M. DWYER.

Wm. M. Dwyer said he attended some meetings in No. 2 ward in support of Mr. Beattie. He met Joshua Doty at these meetings in the room where division 8 met. Doty was a strong Conservative, like the witness.

Q—Was this committee meeting in London Lane?
A—Yes.

Q—That's where the beer was. Did you see any?
A—I had a little.
