BY FALL OF EMBANKMENT

Two-Year-Old Child Devoured

by Bears—Deputy Sheriff

of Montreal Killed.

Victoria, B. C., Jan. 30.—The steamer
Victoria, which has arrived here from
Yokohama, brought news of a serious
accident at Nanjing, as a result of
which 200 persons were killed. On Jan.
12 a portion of the Shikuan embank-
ment in Nanjing collapsed and 200
Chinamen were buried.

CHILDREN ATTACKED BY BEARS.

Richmond, Jan. 30.—A Bedford City,
Vt., special says: A few days ago
three black bears attacked the children
of a mountaineer named Parker, living
on the road from Mone to Arcadia, on
the James River, and killed and ate
his 2-year-old baby. Parker's three
children were playing on the edge of
the woods only a few hundred yards
from the house, when the bears sud-
denly made their appearance. The two
elder children rushed to the house, for-
getting the baby. The father and
mother ran to save the little one, but
the bears had killed the child.

DEPUTY SHERIFF FATALLY IN-

JURED.
Montreal, Jan. 30.—J. Arthur
Francher, deputy sheriff at Montreal,
died yesterday at Marchville, Que., as
the result of an accident while a pas-
senger on the Vermont Railway.
He was on his way to March-

vile to visit his father, and while the
train was near Richmond station the
car in which Mr. Francher was a pas-
senger broke from the train. The de-
railed car ran into the fore part of
the train, which had stopped. Mr.
Francher sustained injuries which re-
sulted in his death at his father's
home.

A DOZEN MEN HURT.

Fort Wayne, Ind., Jan. 30.—An ex-
plosion at the Eckhart Packing Com-
pany's plant this morning buried a
dozen men in the ruins, all of whom
were injured, some it is believed,
fatally. A large part of the plant was
destroyed, and a fire followed the ex-
plosion. Two bodies have been taken
from the Eckhart plant, and others
are still in the ruins. Four injured
taken to the hospital are believed to
be fatally hurt.

MAN DRAGGED BY A TRAIN.

St. Catharines, Ont., Jan. 30.—Frank
Mill of Niagara Falls, was nearly
killed yesterday at that place. He was
working in the yard, and did not no-
tice a train backing up. He was
struck, thrown down and dragged
considerable distance, with the result
that before the train could be stopped
he was so badly injured that it is
feared he will not survive.

FOUND DEAD.

New York, Jan. 30.—Mrs. Clara Nor-
ton Fuller, a professional pianist of
some prominence and well-known to
the musical public, was found dead
in her apartment in the Metropolitan
Hotel last night. Indications were
that death had resulted from a hem-
orrhage.

STARTLING REVELATIONS MADE

BY A FRENCH YELLOW BOOK

An Acute Phase of the Balkan
Question Reached.

SITUATION CAUSES ANXIETY

Austria and Russia Said to Have
Agreed on Joint Naval Coer-

cision of Turkey.
London, Jan. 30.—The publication
of a French yellow-book, detailing the
efforts made by France and Russia
during the past year to induce Turkey
to institute reforms in Macedonia,
which resulted in the tour through the
Balkans of Count Lamsdorff, and in
the Austro-Russian agreement regard-
ing press reforms in Turkey, is held
to indicate a new phase of the Balkan
question.

The rumors that Austria is prepar-
ing a squadron of six naval torpedoes
of Pola, the passage of the Russian tor-
pedo boats through the Dardanelles into
the Black Sea, and other inci-
dents are being recalled; while the of-
ficial denials of mobilization rumors
issued by the Austrian Government
are received with some skepticism.
No serious trouble has ever been ex-

FIREMEN PROSTRATED.

had been shut down, as some of the

NINETEEN FACTORIES IDLE.

Lockport, N. Y., Jan. 30.—Twenty of
Lockport's 55 factories are shut down
owing to the fire at Niagara Falls.
Fortunately most of the large mills
are run by water and steam power.
The newspaper plants and smaller fac-
tories are idle. The street car service
is at a standstill, except one line which
operated by Buffalo power and the
Buffalo line, which is reduced to one
car hourly. The city lighting is not
affected.

A TERRIBLE THUNDERSTORM VISITED

this city during the night, accompan-
ied by a severe hail storm, and accom-
panied by lightning and torrents of rain.

ANOTHER ACCOUNT.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Jan. 30.—The
plant of the Niagara Falls power house
was damaged by a bolt of lightning
which struck a cable with defective
insulation, causing a short circuit,
which blew up a transformer in the
power house. The large cables lead-
ing from the generating room to the
transformer room were soon ablaze,
the flames communicating to the trans-
former house. When the firemen ar-
rived a large amount of water was
showered into the building and at 12:45
o'clock the flames were extinguished.
At 2 o'clock another alarm was sound-
ed, flames having broken out again in
the transformer house.

As soon as possible the work of re-
placing the damaged cable was begun
and within two hours temporary ar-
rangements had been made with the
Niagara Falls Hydraulic Power and
Manufacturing Company, whereby
power was secured for operating the
local and Buffalo trolley line. The
company refused to discuss the
cause of the fire, stating that it can-
not be estimated. That it will reach
several thousands of dollars there is
no doubt. It is stated today that the
manufacturers retreating their cover
from the Niagara Falls Power Com-
pany will soon receive power in ac-
cordance with the terms of their con-
tracts.

THE MONROE DOCTRINE.

The February number of the National
Review, says a dispatch from Lon-
don, contains a dispatch from Cap-
tain John A. MacMahon, in which it
is pointed out that the United States
considers it "essential to her interests
and to those of peace, to withhold
aid from any action which might
lead to European intervention in the
international concerns of an American
state."

Following with the Venezuela dispute,
Capt. MacMahon remarks: "Such an oc-
currence as the existing difficulty be-
tween Venezuela, Germany and Great
Britain, requires constant and sensitive
attention. This does not imply a doubt
of the wisdom and firmness of the
Government, but indicates an instinctive
political apprehension not elicited
by greater and immediate interests
in quarters external to the American
continent."

"Not to invade the rights of an Amer-
ican state is to the United States an
obligation with the force of law. To
permit no European state to in-
fluence them is a matter of policy. The
preponderant American power, but she
does not aspire to be paramount. She
does not find the true complement of
the Monroe doctrine in an undefined
control over American states, exercised
by her and denied to Europe."
"Its correlative is abstention from in-
terference in questions territorially
European."

Big Timber Sale.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 30.—The lum-
ber mills at Port Blakely, together with
15,000 acres of timber land in Mason
and Kitsap counties, have been sold
for \$3,000,000 to a syndicate of Michi-
gan lumbermen. The deal, which has
been progressing for some time, has
just been closed at San Francisco at
the office of Raton, Holmes & Co.,
who were the majority stockholders.
