London, Jan. 18. - The Times this morning publishes the text of a re-markable letter received by mail from its Tokio correspondent which the date Herbert Spencer wrote in 1892 to Baron Kentaro Kaneko, who sought his advice on the policy of Japan. The gist of Herbert Spencer's advice to the baron was to keep Europeans and Americans as much as possible at arm's length, and to take every precaution to give as little foothold as possible to foreigners, and furthermore, to absolutely forbid the marriage of Japanese with foreigners.
