"LIKE A SUBURB OF HELL"

A Description of Concentration Camp in Philippines

By a United States Officer-Every Living Thing Outside Was Shot.

Washington, D. C., May 20. - The subject of the concentration of the inhabitants in the Philippines into camps was a leading topic of the discussion of the Philippine bill in the senate today. Mr. Bacon, Georgia, attacked the policy concentration, likening it to the reconcentrado camps established by Gen.

Weyler in Cuba.
"Is it," Mr. Bacon asked, "the purpose of the United States to retain the Philippine Islands in colonial dependto grant them a government of their own?" That, he thought, was the great central question around which all other questions relating to the islands must revolve.

"If," said he, "we have the high and purpose of giving the Filipinos a free government-whether partial or absolute-then now is the time for congress to act upon that purpose.' He declared the responsibility for the situation-including the outrages com-mitted, the burning of towns and the reconcentration of Filipinos - must rest upon those who have authorized and justified the policy of the govern-

"LIKE SOME SUBURB OF HELL." Mr. Bacon read a letter from an army officer, for whom he vouched and whom he knew personally, describing in vivid language a reconcentrado camp. The letter said this camp was located in a soggy place, where rain fell continually, and outside of which every living thing was shot. In that camp there were 30 cases of smallpox and five cases were added each day. Clouds of vampire bats circled softly over the place, awaiting the dead coming to them every day. The camp was "like some sub-

urb of hell." Mr. Foraker said that Mr. Bacon had likened the concentration camps in the Philippines to those in Cuba, established under Gen. Weyler. The establishment of the camps, Mr. For aker said, was not an act of brutality, as had been charged, but an act of mercy and kindness and a means of protecting the people from the roving bands of banditti. Mr. Foraker declared his purpose to accept the word of Gen. Bell and Gen. Wheaton and other United States officers concerning these camps rather than that of a man

whose name was not given. Mr. Hoar said everybody knew and it useless to try to disguise the fact that it was difficult to get the army officers to testify as to matters which reflected on the administration of a war. They were brave men, but they flinched from making such criticism. They were apt to fear that their promotion, for which they were constantly striving, would be affected.

New York, May 21.—Rev. Dr. John R. Hykes, agent of the American Bible Society, in Shanghai, China, has sub-Society, in Shanghai, China, has submitted a report to the society on conditions and the outlook in China. Dr. Hykes says the question of a recurrence of the recent troubles in China depends on whether the government of the empire wants another outbreak. One government college has applied for a grant of fifty Bibles for the use of its students, and old scholars are scattered over the world in the government service in the capacity of translators interpreters and teachers of English, "One of the signs of the times," says Dr. Hykes, "Is a remarkable movement on the part of some of the highest officials in the land to make a re-translation or revision of the Bible, with the view of putting it into what they consider a more worthy literary form. This work is now in progress with imperial sanction. The officials hope just to acquaint the official class with the contents of the Bible, and remove their prejudices against it, and thereby against Christianity. CUBA'S CONDITION NOW AND IN THE PAST

During Their Stay on the Island.

Good Work Done by the American

New York, May 21.-In a dispatch from Havana, the World publishes, over the signature of Gen. Leonard Wood, a review of the work accomplished during the American regime in the island, the government of which will be handed over today to the Cubans. Public order, says the article, is perfect throughout the island. Cuba is free from all contagious diseases, and its death rate compares favorably with that of the United States. An efficient and well-equipped school system has been established. The hospitals, charities and jails have been reorganized, rebuilt and reequipped. During the last year 25 per cent of the total revenues of the island went into public education. Schools have been constructed at the rate of more than one a day for the past year. The lighthouses have been rebuilt and re-equipped, and two first-class lights have just been completed on the rado reefs. The ports and harbors have been fully supplied with buoys and service fully organized and equipped The same is true of the customs house service and launches. Complete quarantine and immigration service has been established. The courts have been reorganized and re-equipped. schools for typewriting and stenog-raphy have been opened. A new law of public works has been written on the lines followed by the U. S. Government. Cities like Santiago and Havana have undergone a sanitary reconstruction. The payment of public officials is practically on the same system as is employed by the United States Government. In short, Cuba is turned over in a well-ordered, healthy condition, and the new government will find all departments well equipped
