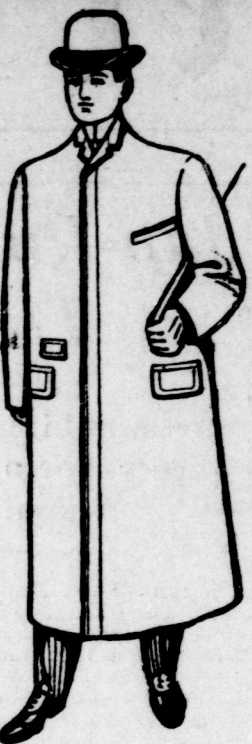

RUSO-JAPANESE PROTOCOL'S TEXT SPARED BY SHOCK THAT KILLED MATE

Prevents Either Side Getting Electrician, "Coming To," Says Reinforcements—Marine Captures Allowed.

Mukden, Manchuria, Sept. 14, 2 p.m. Gen. Fukushima, presenting Field Marshal Oyama, and Gen. Ovanovski, representing Gen. Linevitch, met at Chabot Station, north of Chantufu to arrange the details of the armistice.

The text of the Russo-Japanese armistice protocol is as follows: (1) A certain distance as a zone of demarcation shall be fixed between the fronts of the armies of the two powers in Manchuria, as well as in the region of the Tuman River, Korea.

(2) The naval forces of one of the belligerents shall not bombard territory belonging to or occupied by the other.

(3) Maritime captures will not be suspended by the armistice.

(4) During the term of the armistice new reinforcements shall not be dispatched to the theater of war. Those which are already on their way there shall not be dispatched north of Mukden on the part of Japan or south of Harbin on the part of Russia.

(5) The commanders of the armies and fleets of the two powers shall determine in common accord the conditions of the armistice in conformity with the provisions above enumerated.

(6) The two Governments shall order their commanders immediately after the signature of the treaty of peace to put the protocol into execution.

The protocol was signed by M. Witte, Baron Rosen, Baron Komura and M. Takahira.

TO BE SUPPLIED WITH SNOW WATER

Los Angeles People Will Bring Down Mountain Stream—Cost \$23,000,000.

Los Angeles, Cal., Sept. 15.—By a vote of 14 to 1 the electors of Los Angeles increased the proposition that the city turn the course of Owens River and bring its waters here from the Sierra Nevada, 246 miles distant.

A bond issue of \$1,500,000 is provided for to cover options and other preliminary expenses and the surveyors will begin operations immediately.

This is the largest water project ever undertaken by any city in the world. The complete cost being estimated at \$23,000,000 and the time required for construction from four to five years.

Los Angeles will get 30,000 inches of pure snow water, solving the greatest problem that has confronted the city, and assuring a supply for all future increase in population.

The surrounding country will be vastly benefited, since the city cannot use all the water it will bring. The river is to be carried here through an immense concrete and steel conduit, having a daily capacity of 200,000,000 gallons, and a mighty mountain range will have to be tunneled.

The present water supply, which comes from the Los Angeles River, is only sufficient for necessities and not for luxuries. It will not permit the development of a park system and other plans to beautify the city, and the extension of the orange industry in the surrounding district is retarded for the same reason.

When Los Angeles was founded in 1781 by Don Felipe de Neve, the Spanish Government bestowed upon the pueblo all the water which should originate in the Los Angeles River, and this right was confirmed by the United States. It differs essentially from the ordinary riparian law, which allows a landowner to draw from a river only as much water as he actually needs.

And the people have since reached the limit of the possibilities of the Los Angeles River in years of average rainfall. This has been apparent for some time. It is evident that the present facilities might possible stand an increase of another hundred thousand people, they would not be sufficient for more than 300,000 altogether.

The water will have a fall of 4,000 feet, which will give it sufficient head for fires and other purposes, and will flow the entire distance by gravity alone. The cost of the property rights for an area of 50 miles square will be \$1,200,000, and to secure them the city officials have taken the responsibility of paying a forfeit of \$100,000.

Mr. Failing took part in the battle of Bull Run, the five days' siege at Murfreesboro, and at Carri-fa-fay.

He enlisted in the Second Ohio Infantry, and after three months' service was transferred to Company C, Thirtieth Ohio.

He is survived by one son, Bert Failing, of Springfield, and two daughters, Mrs. Catherine Foster, of Edwardsville, Ill., and Mrs. E. H. Niemeier, 1475 Flournoy street, Chicago.

It is probable there was no other Union or Confederate soldier who had a record like that of Nathaniel Failing. Born at Little Washington, Pa., in 1826, he with eight brothers, joined the Union army on the same day in April, 1861, at Mechanicsburg, Ohio, where Nathaniel was employed at the cooper trade. The ages of the brothers ranged from 19 to 45 years. William, the eldest, was the father of thirteen children.

The brothers gave up their lives in the following battles: John, at Fort Donelson, Tenn., in February, 1862; James, at Pea Ridge, Ark., March, 1862; Daniel, at Shiloh, April, 1862; Louis, at Corinth, Miss., October, 1862; Henry, at Gettysburg, July, 1863; Morris, Joel and William, at Chickamauga, September, 1863.

A few days before his death Mr. Failing, in an interview, said: "I never heard any of my brothers tell me they were killed in the war. At the battle of Chickamauga, where Thomas, Joel and William were killed, I was at their side when they fell. I was terribly wounded there, both legs being pierced by bullets, also both hips, the right shoulder and right hand. I lay on the field for a day and a night, praying that I might die and be relieved of my suffering."

"On March 13, 1864, I was ordered to leave the hospital at Nashville, and I was sent to the hospital at Columbus, Ohio, where I stayed until I was mustered out in June, 1865."

"I went back to the old home in Mechanicsburg, from where the boys enlisted, only to find that my father had moved to a little mining town near McKeesport, Pa., on the Monongahela River. He was living with one of his daughters, Mrs. Wm. Hurt. My mother had died. I was told, before father moved away."

"I was still walking on crutches when I reached my sister's home. Father was sitting in a rocker when I hobbled in, a wreck of my former self. I was so changed that he did not know me. My sister was out. Giving me his own easy chair, father at once asked me what regiment was with. When I told him of the battle of Chickamauga, he sprang to his feet and wanted to know if I had met his four sons—Morris, Joel, William and myself. He had mourned us all as dead, having read the list of killed, in which our names were."

John E. Ross, jun., an electrician, started to string a telephone wire. This led the primary high tension leader from the municipal electric light plant. Ross fell, writhing. Edward Saum, 29 years old, his assistant ran to his aid. In an instant, he, too, was thrashing in the deadly metal coil.

While men were dragging the unconscious bodies to the air and telephoning for doctors, Joseph Ring, years old, one of the company's teamsters, leaned forward to peer at the bodies and grasped the wire with his right hand. Instantly he fell dead.

The doctors found Saum beyond help, but Ross' condition puzzled them. He was terribly burned about the head and hands, but he was conscious and fearless at his throat with his finger-nails.

A surgeon operated in a hurry and found the trouble. Ross had involuntarily swallowed a wooden toothpick, which had lodged in his throat.

Ross declared that the shock caused him absolutely no pain. "I just felt as though somebody was pulling me forward," he said, "and I had pretty dreams."
