\$250,000 ANNUALLY FOR UNIVERSITY

Sum To Be Taken from Succession Dues.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, May 2. - The evening session of the Legislature was taken up with the address of Premier Whitney, in moving the university bill into the committee stage, and Hon. Mr. Harcourt's reply on behalf of the Opposi-

There was a small attendance of members, but educational experts, including all the members of the commission, were present in force. Hon. Mr. Ross and Hon. Mr. Hanna were both absent through illness. The Premier, after reading nearly

said he had no apology for making the main portion of his upon the report of the commission. The Government indorsed all the conclusions cited therein, and had seen the way clear to adopt all the recommendations except as to the endowment of land. As a money endowment the Government proposed a sum to be equal to a sum based on the average of three years' revenue. The percentage had not been fixed, but the endeavor would be to secure to the university a sum of about \$250,000 annually. Therefore, the administration took full

responsibility. The authorities of all the institutions concerned were in full accord with the bill. The Government was actuated only by a burning desire for the success of the university, in which they had every confidence. He had the personal satisfaction of knowing that the Government had redeemed its every pledge regarding the university, and looked for no higher honor than the Government was achieving by putting the future of the institution on a firm basis. Mr. Harcourt, in reply, referred to

the interesting fact that 56 years ago Dr. Goldwin Smith, a member of the present commission, was appointed by the Imperial Government to report on a scheme of reform for Oxford University. The present commission had performed its work with "zeal, tact, good sense and zeal," the words applied to the Oxford commission by Mr. John Morley. Mr. Harcourt thought Toronto University should pay more attention to the scientific side of education, instead of subordinating it to the human, or the culture side. He quoted statistics to show that the Liberal Government had not been niggardly with the university. Speaking of the report, Mr. Harcourt agreed in the main with its conclusions, but he took issue with some of the reasons advanced for these conclusions. He denied that there had been any decline of public sympathy for the university, or any partisanship in connection with its administration. The Premier's motion was carried at 10:30 p.m.
