The Pere Marquette brought the crew to St. Thomas, and the M. C. R. took charge of the train after that.

Hundreds of people lined the shore and watched the wreck. were sticking to the ship as best they could, but spent a night and day of anxiety and worry. Cannot Weather Storm. As stoutly built as the Ashtabula Late Mrs. Newton. certainly is, it is not thought that she can withstand the fury of the storm
