The boats were filled largely with women and children, but had sufficient members of the Titanic's crew to guide them. The belief was general here this forenoon that all of the survivors are on board the Carpathia.

The steamer Virginian, which halted her voyage from Halifax to Livrpool, when near the scene of disaster, will not come to St. Johns, as reported. She saw no sign of surviv-


