

## CUT OUT FEES IS FARMERS' PLEA

Biggs Promises To Take Matter Up With Attorney-General.

(By Staff Reporter.)

DUTTON, Aug. 16.—A strong deputation of West Elgin farmers, including two county councillors, and headed by Dr. Hugh Stevenson, M.P.P. for London, waited upon Hon. Frank C. Biggs, minister of highways, here this afternoon, asking him to exert his influence with Attorney-General Flanagan with reference to the prevailing system of rewarding county constables with fees. The minister assured them that he would take the matter up immediately upon return to Toronto. The farmers insist that the attorney-general cause an order-in-council to be issued restricting the "fee" system of pay for constables who arrest speedsters until the next session of the House or until such time as the Government may deem fitting.

## PENSIONERS BENEFIT BY EXCHANGE PREMIUM

OTTAWA, Aug. 16.—(By Canadian Press).—The benefit of par rate of exchange to imperial pensioners resident in Canada before the war will be included in the next payment only to those who have their declaration forms returned at once, so that the necessary work may be completed, according to a statement issued tonight by the board of pension commissioners. The board has circularized all imperial pensioners resident in Canada who draw their payments through the office paying the provisions of orders-in-council and of the proofs required from the pensioner to establish entitlement at par exchange. To secure the par rate on sterling payments the pensioner must submit evidence that he was resident in Canada at the outbreak of war.

## CAN FIND NO TRACE OF WETZEL'S BODY

Search Being Continued At Grand Bend For Victim of Drowning.

(Special to The Advertiser.) GRAND BEND, Aug. 16.—Continuous dragging of the lake all day today failed to reveal any trace of the body of Calvin Wetzel of Windsor, who was drowned while in for a swim on Sunday. The search will be continued tomorrow.

Wetzel, who was 23 years old, was a son of L. C. Wetzel, of 1032 Quellerie avenue, Windsor. Only a short time ago he graduated in mechanical engineering at the University of Michigan. He came to the Bend with Jos. Gilmore, a college chum of Ann Arbor, Mich., to spend the week-end at the summer home of Mrs. A. Richards.

The victim had been a resident of Windsor for about five years, coming over with his parents from Toledo. He was born in Pennsylvania. Both at Scott high school, Toledo, where he finished his preparatory education, and at the University of Michigan, he was known as an athlete of no little ability. He played football at Toledo and during his four years in the university he was a member of the track team.

Besides his parents he is survived by two brothers, Malcolm and Samuel, both of whom are in Muskoka.

Executive of North Oxford Organization Delays Making Choice.

## COUNCIL POSTPONES MOTOR TRUCK DEAL

Money For Purchase Was Set Aside in Private Bill.

ST. THOMAS, Aug. 16.—The consideration of the purchase of a motor truck for the fire department at an outlay of \$12,500 was postponed indefinitely at a meeting of the council tonight. The sum of \$12,500 has been set aside by a private bill passed at the last session of the Legislature for such a purpose. But, owing to a feeling of uneasiness of the aldermen that the prices of motor trucks will make a substantial drop before another year passes, several of the aldermen, supported by a number of rate-payers, favor a delay in the expenditure of so large an amount, and would postpone until the finances of the city would suggest such an investment.

Mayor Brinkman was opposed to the purchase at present, and saw in the near future a possible drop in the price of machinery of the kind. The mayor advised a postponement of a year at least, when the city may be in a more favorable position to buy.

As some of the members of the council were absent, the mayor refused to permit the meeting to discuss the question until there was a full board.

On Service Station. The application of W. H. Dake and E. D. Bowby for permission to erect a gas and oil service station at the corner of Talbot and Railway streets was referred to the board of works.

The Hydro-Electric Commission wrote that it was willing to supply power to electric metal signs, which it suggested that the council place on the top of the hill. Talbot street west, one at First avenue, Talbot street east, and one at head of Wilson avenue. The council agreed to accept the proposition. The band will be requested to give a concert at the park on the evening of the Labor Day demonstration.

ONLY MARRIED TWO WEEKS. NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Aug. 16.—John Harrison, aged 28, was fatally injured while working on the hydro power canal last evening, when a dump car overturned, partly burying him with rock. He died in the hospital. Harrison had been married only two weeks to a Toronto girl.

## ROLLO CONSIDERS RADIAL REPORTS TOO EXTREME

Advocates Better Service On Lines To Get Increased Patronage.

TORONTO, Aug. 16.—Hon. Walter Rollo, minister of labor, who sits for East Hamilton, which is a strongly-progressive constituency, expressed the opinion that both the majority and minority reports submitted to the government by the Sutherland commission are too severe.

As far as Hamilton is concerned, the surrounding district is well supplied with radial accommodation, "but they would be better patronized if they gave a better service," the minister observed.

## PHOTO ENGRAVERS ARE URGED TO CONTINUE BATTLE FOR RIGHTS

Samuel Gompers Addresses Convention and Outlines Labor's Policy.

TORONTO, Aug. 16.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, today addressed the International Photo-Engravers' Union, assembled here in convention, delivering a message of which the text was the common goal of democratic progress and the modern labor movement.

The labor veteran, following an eloquent address by Matthew Well, described the democratic nature of government on this continent. Canada, he said, is a nation whose only link with imperial control is her governor-general, "and the governor-general of Canada has about as much to do with the affairs of the Dominion of Canada as has a goose with the determination of latitude and longitude, though I say that without disrespect, but with respect to the hero who has just landed as governor-general."

The maintenance of this democracy, Mr. Gompers declared, rests with the people of today and tomorrow, and it is their betterment for which organized labor is striving.

Mr. Gompers concluded his address with a plea to the Photo-Engravers' Union to continue their battle, and urged them to protest to Congress against the proposed importation of Chinese labor into American territory.

"The advance of the tolling masses of the Americas shall be triumphant," he cried. "We shall advance flouting our banners in the faces of our enemies. Let them do their worst."

At the close of the convention, Mr. Gompers was escorted to the hotel by a large delegation of the union members.
