PRESTON STORE-KEEPER ROBBED

Joseph Warden Held Up by Unknown Strangers.

Thugs Make Escape in 'Car After Securing \$200.

GALT, June 4.—Hold-up men visited the town of Preston last night and made a good haul. Shortly before midnight, just as he was preparing to close up for the night, Joseph Warden, who runs a grocery store at the east end of King street, in that town, had a young man come into the store and ask for a package of cigarettes. Mr. Warden turned to get them, and as he faced the stranger again was confronted by a gun in the customer's hands, with the demand that he show where the cash drawer was. Mr. Warden had no other alternative but to obey, and the hold-up men cleaned out the till, and backed out of the store, and with two accomplices, one of whom was on guard, whisked away in a Ford car. It is estimated that the hold-up netted the robbers between \$200 and \$250, the day's receipts.

It is reported that a Ford car with three strangers had been seen in the vicinity of Warden's store on two or three occasions during the evening. The police were immediately notified and messages were sent broadcast, but a good description of the men was not obtained, and there is not much to work on.

Upon his return on Saturday from the capital to spend the week-end at his home here, William Elliott, M. P., announced that on Friday he and President S. L. Clark of the board of trade had interviewed Hon. Charles Murphy, postmaster-general, in regard to the purchase of the site of the old Imperial Hotel for a new postoffice building, which is badly needed, as the present quarters are taxed to the limit. The postmaster-general promised to recommend to the minister of public works the purchase of this property with the idea of building at a later date. Photographs of the property in question were submitted to the postmaster-general, and it was emphasized that now a branch of the customs department was in a separate building, and it was advocated that in the new building the postoffice, customs department and Canadian National Railways and Express offices should be accommodated. Postoffice inspectors will now have to inspect the site, which is a splendid one, and practically opposite the present postoffice.

ORANGE ORDER ATTENDS SERVICE AT ST. THOMAS

Rev. J. R. Turnbull Delivers Interesting Address at Center Street Baptist Church.

ST. THOMAS, June 4.—Declaring that while man frequently offers an excuse for not accepting Christ, he cannot give a valid reason, Rev. J. R. Turnbull delivered an interesting sermon at Center Street Baptist Church this afternoon to about 500 members of the Orange Order. About 300 brethren from the Forest City joined with their local friends at the annual parade. Three fine and strong bands conducted the parade to and from the church.

Mr. Turnbull used as a theme for his remarks the words: "What think ye of Christ," Matthew 22:42. This question, he said, was one that must be answered by every person desirous of being a Christian. He said that it matters not whether a man accepted Christ's teachings, it was his belief in Christ that counted.

GARAGE WRECKED BY EXPLOSIONS

HAMILTON, June 4.—Two terrific explosions which tore gaping holes in the roof of a garage, shattered almost every window within a radius of half a mile, and started, from their sleep citizens who reside more than a mile from the scene, preceded a blaze which destroyed a \$1,500 garage and a \$5,800 truck at midnight Saturday. The garage is located a short distance from the street, near the corner of Cannon and Catharine streets. The explosions were caused by the bursting of two oxy-acetylene tanks which were hurled through the roof. Four men in the garage escaped without injury.

Guelph Merchants Discover Money Missing After "B lessing" by Gypsies

GUELPH, June 4.—A band of gypsies, comprising about 15 people altogether, arrived on the outskirts of the city Friday evening on the Eramosa Road, where they spent the night, and Saturday morning they proceeded to enter the city and some of them, it is alleged, had a very profitable morning.

Several of the women entered the cigar store of James Hillis on Upper Wyndham street. Mr. Hillis went to answer the telephone, leaving a small bag containing a sum of money amounting to \$16 lying on the counter. When he returned the money was missing and also one of the gypsies, but the others still remained in the store.

Blesses Money. Not long after this L. N. E. Lafontaine came down to the police station and stated that he was just \$20 short in his cash as the result of a visit to his place of business of some of the gypsies. They adopted an altogether different method of doing business with Mr. Lafontaine. One of the gypsies said she would like to bless his money, and he promptly pulled out a roll of bills from his pocket.

She asked him to take some silver out of another pocket so that she could bless that, too, and as she took the bills in her hand she opened

them up, in order to do the job properly, and then she neatly folded them up again, and he returned the roll to his pocket, but in a short time discovered that there was \$20 missing.

Still later in the morning, R. B. Robson came over to the police station and reported that he was out the sum of \$9 as the result of a visit made to his place of business on MacDonnell street. He claims that this is a case of straight theft, and that when one of the women succeeded in getting the cashier to come out into the showroom another went into the office and deliberately tapped the till.

Finally Plead Guilty. When the two women were held by the chief and a charge of theft laid against them, the other members of the party were not long in coming to the rescue. They at first denied that there was anything wrong, but when they were formally brought before the magistrate, and Mary and Carmella Markovitch charged with the theft of the money, they saw a jail sentence staring them in the face and decided to plead guilty. They agreed to repay the money which was stolen, and in addition to this, each one of the women was fined \$25 and costs, which was promptly paid. They were then ordered to leave the city at once.

Her husband predeceased her five years. No family survives. Two sisters, Mrs. Pettie, in the Southern States, and Mrs. J. W. Laird of Detroit, and two brothers, William and John Brophy of Detroit, are the bereaved relatives.

Mrs. Lewis was born in London, Ont., and lived there until her marriage, when she moved to Tilbury.

The funeral will be held on Monday afternoon and will be under the auspices of the Masonic fraternity in which he was an officer. Interment will be in Stewart Cemetery.

WILL AID PROBING TURK ATROCITIES

WASHINGTON, June 4.—The United States government has accepted the invitation of Great Britain to be represented on the commission which is to investigate the alleged Turkish atrocities in Anatolia.

In announcing the decision today, however, the state department emphasized that as understood here the commission's duties are to be limited to making an inquiry into conditions purely for the information of the governments participating.

The United States does not by its participation assume any further obligation or enter into any commitment.

"EMPRESS SPECIAL" TRAINS TO START

VANCOUVER, June 4.—The first Empress steamship special will leave this city on Monday afternoon at 6 o'clock, immediately following the arrival of the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Asia, from the Orient. The Empress steamship special will deliver passengers in Chicago 72 hours after their arrival in Vancouver. It will be routed on the main line as far as Moose Jaw, and thence south over the Soo Line to Chicago.

TILBURY DIES SUDDENLY

W. J. Taylor Succumbs to Heart Attack While Motoring.

TILBURY, June 4.—W. J. Taylor, one of Tilbury's most highly esteemed citizens died suddenly from heart failure Friday evening. He had driven his auto out to Tilbury East Township where he owns a couple of farms, and after pulling some rhubarb at one of the farms that is worked by Robert Foreman, he started the car to return to town.

In the car with him were two nieces, and when he stopped the car, which had only gone a few lengths and started to get out, one of the girls asked him if he were sick. He replied that he was, and very sick.

He fell over as he was getting out of the car, and was lifeless in a moment. Medical attendance was instantly summoned, but all attempts to revive him were futile.

He had been a resident of the town of Tilbury for the past eight years, and had operated a garage here in addition to overseeing his farms in Tilbury East. He was well known as a lean, growing expert throughout Essex and Kent counties, was 61 years of age and was born at Morpeth, Ontario.

He leaves his widow and one son, Clarence. He was a member of the Methodist Church and one of the strong supports of the local congregation.
