GREAT BRITAIN WOULD FREE TRANSJORDANIA

Will Confer Independent Government If League Gives Consent.

Jerusalem, May 17.—Great Britain is prepared to confer independent government on Transjordan if the League of Nations gives its consent, says an official communiqué issued yesterday. Provided a constitutional form of government is set up giving Britain the possibility of fulfilling her international obligations toward that country, the government agrees to declare the Palestine territory east of the Jordan autonomous and not subject to Sir Herbert Samuel's jurisdiction, the statement declares.
