THREE U.S. COUNTERFEIT BILLS IN CIRCULATION

Citizens Urged by Banks To Be On Guard Against

POORLY MADE

None Found in London Yet, But in Circulation in Province.

Counterfeit notes, described as new and dangerous, are again in circulation. The bills are of three and probably more denominations. A counterfeit United States gold certificate is in circulation. It is of the series of 1922, signed by H. H Speelman, registrar of the treasury, and Frank White, treasurer of the United States. The notes are printed f thin paper. Between the pieces dark, but even at that it has boled a good many. The portrait of Washington on the face of the bill is poorly executed. The back is light gates immediately.

There is a \$5 federal reserve note raised to the denomination of \$20 by means of a stencil. This also bears the portrait of Lincoln, which is used on \$5 notes only. This fact readily reveals that the bill is a five and not a twenty.
