

NEWS FROM LONDON.

Death of Rt. Hon. C. E. Childers—To Relieve Depression in Germany.

The Kaiser Orders Torpedo Destroyers From World-Renowned British Builders.

LONDON, Jan. 29.—Right Hon. C. E. Childers, ex-member of parliament and the occupant of several offices in former Liberal cabinets, died at 5 o'clock this afternoon from congestion of the lungs.

It is stated by a member of the College of Cardinals that Pope Leo will positively refuse his consent to the proposed baptism of Prince Boris of Bulgaria into the Greek Catholic church.

The resolution introduced by Herr von Hammerstein-Loxten, in the Prussian diet, replying to questions on the subject, asserted that the government was doing all that was possible to relieve the agricultural depression.

A Berlin despatch, to the Times says: "The statement that the Bundesrath has rejected the proposal adopted by the Reichstag last February for a currency conference is now contradicted by influential parties."

A semi-official announcement has been given out at St. Petersburg that the reports that a partition of Turkey is contemplated are unfounded.

The Constantinople correspondent to the Times says that although no definite agreement exists for the immediate or proximate Russian occupation of Armenia, it is certain there is a private understanding between Russia and the Sultan which gives the Sultan confidence in Russian friendship and disposes him to conform to Russian advice in matters of foreign policy.

A despatch from Berlin to the Times says a semi-official statement has been published warning President Crespo of Venezuela that he cannot count on the help of the United States to enable him to America direct from Berlin and Paris is unconfirmed.

LONDON, Jan. 30.—A bye-election occurred to-day in the Brixton division of Lambeth to choose a successor to the Marquis of Carmarthen, Conservative. The poll resulted as follows: Hubbard, Conservative, 4,403; Munn, Liberal, 2,131; Conservative majority, 2,262.

The Westminster Gazette says it is almost certain that Justin McCarthy will not resume the leadership of the Irish party in parliament after the re-assembling of that body.

The reply of the Sultan to the letter of the Queen on the subject of the Armenian troubles has been despatched to Casak Pasha Antioch, Turkish ambassador in London.

From information obtained on the best possible authority it can be stated that nothing is known in St. Petersburg about the supposed treaty between Russia and Turkey. The report caused a great deal of attention in diplomatic circles, but in the view of those best informed there is nothing more behind the report than the good understanding which prevails between the two countries.

B.C. Fishermen to Be Allowed to Use Pound Nets in Boundary Bay.
