
Annual Free Press Trophy Event Arranged For At Banquet Meeting of North End Club

Widener the com-ing season, and will report for duty as soon as the horses in charge of Trainer J. H. Keene arrive at Belmont Park from Kentucky within the next few days. With Sande riding his horses in this country, and Frank Keogh piloting those that will race in his name in France, Mr. Widener will be splendidly equip-ped with jockeys and should win his share of races both here and on the continent. 

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
