When Milton found himself cut off from taking as active a part as he desired in the affairs of England, during one of the greatest national crises through which the nation has passed, because of his blindness, he sang, "They also serve who only stand and wait." The line has in it an appeal and a solace for many of us to-day. The world is now passing through one of the greatest crises in its whole history, and one that is going to have, not a temporary, but a lasting, effect on the whole future of the political, moral and spiritual outlook of mankind. It is a terrible tragedy, a terrible struggle, in which hundreds of thousands are giving their lives, in which millions are suffering physical pain, and many millions more passing through the greater vicarious agony of waiting for news of loved ones, perhaps sons, husbands or lovers, who have gone to the front. Many of us, however, have no sacrifice to make. We are unable, for one positive reason or another, to go ourselves, and have made no sacrifice by having to give permission to some one else to go. Yet we need not be downcast; we are also a part of the great army fighting against a Teuton overlordship of the world, with its doctrine of force as the court of final appeal, and submission to autocratic centralized government as the best form of relationship of man to man. Without the men at home who mine the coal, the men who make gasoline, the men of the machine shops who make the motors, the men who maintain and run the railways, and the rest of us who are engaged in one way or another in keeping the affairs of the nation going, the men at the front

To Save the Union

Canada, it is now announced, is to make a contribution of 150,000 men to the fighting forces in Belgium and France, and Germany. The next contingent of 21,000 men are to sail in January, and thereafter as frequently as they can be supplied. Of this January force 15,000 are men o the second contingent proper, and the rest reinforcements for the first contingent, which by that time will have been in action.

The call for two millions of men in Britain shows that the authorities have no idea of an early or easy close to the war. It is not too much to ask Canada, which has derived so much from the British army and navy at no cost but that of more or less cheerful gratitude, to contribute as many volunteers as may be willing to help to save the union of free peoples, known to the rest of the world as the British Empire.

been placed at 57,000 by Premier Asquith, reply to a question in the House of Commons. This is onethird of the original contingent, and indicates a heavy demand upon the courage and endurance of the troops. Bearing Fruit

The campaign for a more general use of the wholesome and palatable apples is assuming continental proportions. The movement inaugurated by the department of trade and commerce has already stimulated a demand that is increasing as the days go by, and if the apple and its products of cider, vinegar and apple butter are not cheap for the Canadian consumer this fall and winter there is something decidedly wrong about the working of the law of supply and demand. The crop through out the country is beyond all records and it threatens an embarrassment of riches, with the usual export trade so largely cut off.

In addition to the two hundred odd ways of serving, fruit contained in the departmental bulletin the United States department of agriculture has devised a table syrup made from apple juice. Seven gallons of ordinary cider will make one of the syrup. The department will furnish the formula to any cider press owner who may wish to manufacture and sell the syrup, which is said to be a cheap and valuable addition to the household stores. Let every day in season be apple day.—Vancouver Sun.
