-The long talked of Nicaragua canal project has been so far advanced by recent United States legislation that the assent of Great Britain to the amendment of the Hay-

Pauncefote treaty, as adopted by the Senate, is reckoned as the only encouragement neces-sary to the speedy beginning of the work. The proposed inter-oceanic water-way will, upon completion, rank as the greatest canal of the world, and the history of the Suez canal affords a fair gauge with which to

measure the commercial importance of a link that will bind the Atlantic and the Pacific and sunder the American continents for the passage of the commerce of the oceans. Such a waterway would place all the Atlantic and Gulf ports of the United States on the

short line to Australia, China, Japan and the Philippines, and would completely revolutionize foreign trade, greatly facilitating its expansion. The coastwise trade would also be similarly benefitted. The fundamental principles of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty outline a canal that shall be open in

time of peace to the vessels of all nation without discrimination, that shall never be blockaded, and the amendments of the Senate do not perhaps modify these principle to an extent to make the treaty unacceptable to Great Britain. It is entirely probable that the British government will overlook the proceedings that were designed to make the enterprize a little bit more American and more satisfying to the jingo element, an
