### British Grain Trade.

The Mark Lane Express of Nov. 4, in its weekly review of the British grain trade, says: English wheats have been stationary, the average price being 24s 6d. Foreign wheats have had a slight change, to the disadvantage of holders, who are now asking 26s for the best Russian, 27s for fine Austra-lian, and 25s for Calcutta. Today No. 2 red winter was quoted at 25s 6d; No. 1 spring, California, Daluth and Manitoba, 26s 6d.

Considerable grain will no doubt remain in stack tillspring, unless the weather is unusually favorable, as after this data favorable threshing weather cannot be expected for very long.
