You protested with unanimous indignation against the President's action when first he shut the doors of University College in the face of women in 1880. When this resolution comes up for discussion, you should give its supporters the encouragement of your presence and sympathy.

To triumph! Old fogyism is doomed. It may die hard, but it must die soon. Peace to its ashes, and no resurrection!
