## U.S. REACTION TO CANADIAN POLICY

Hon. Marcel Lambert (Edmonton West): Mr. Speaker, I wish to direct a question to the right hon. Prime Minister.

Could he tell us whether he has passed on to the President of the United States and to members of his cabinet the information given to him by the Canadian association of independent oil producers, to the effect that the Northern part of the United States could absorb between 150,000 and 200,000 barrels of Canadian fuel oil per day, and in the affirmative, what was their reaction?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, I have discussed this question broadly last week with the President of the United States, and we have agreed to organize meetings of officials, which are to begin effectively tomorrow in Washington. Canadian officials will discuss this problem with United States officials.

Mr. Lambert: Mr. Speaker, I should like to ask a complementary question.

Has the Canadian government adopted the same policy as the United States, particularly in appointing a group called a task force, from here-to justify and, hopefully, support made up of a committee of ministers whose task would be to follow this question, or is member is not going to speak in accordance the Canadian government going to appoint with the fact that he was recognized by Your only civil servants?
