SMOKED HERRING INDUSTRY

EAST TIMOR

Mrs. Beryl Gaffney (Nepean): Mr. Speaker, this morning the BBC reported that the Government of Australia is reconsidering its formal recognition of Indonesia's sovereignty over East Timor in response to the recent massacre of close to 200 unarmed Timorese.

Canada has in recent years recognized Indonesia's rule in fact. This runs against the grain of international efforts to shed light on the horrendous human rights violations in East Timor. The International Red Cross has been denied access. Human rights workers are steering clear of the area as there are allegations that they are forcing the disappearance of witnesses to the massacre.

Will the government take immediate action to suspend Canadian aid to Indonesia until the review of Canadian aid and commercial activities in Indonesia is completed and will it press the UN Security Council for full implementation of Security Council resolutions 389 and 384? These are very strongly worded resolutions which direct Indonesia to withdraw its troops completely and
