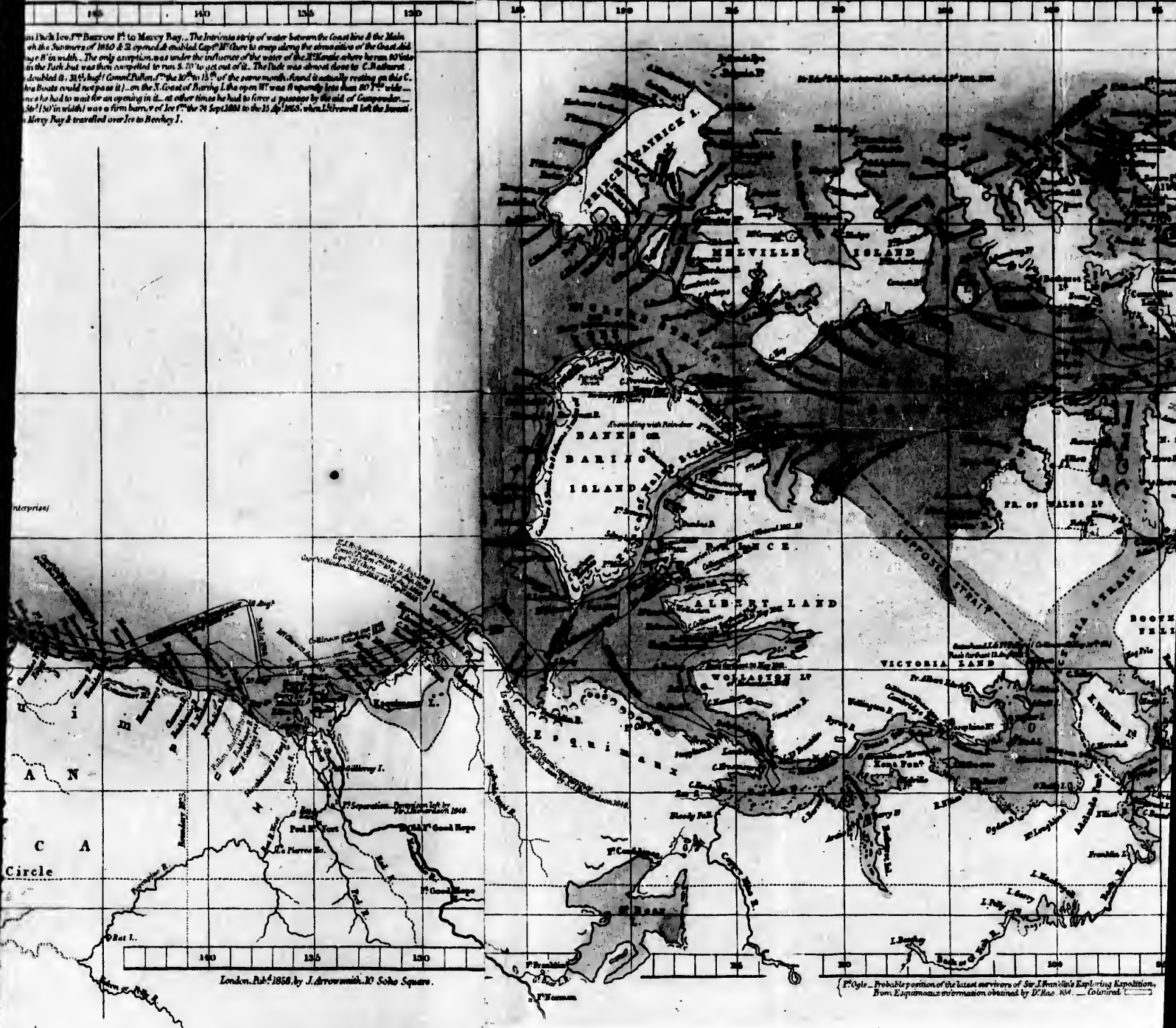


Mr. Gault's Discoveries are coloured.

as thick ice. Mr. Bell's Bay to Navy Bay. The intricate strip of water between the coast line & the Main, with the Summers of 1860 & 33 opened & enabled Capt. Bell to creep along the atmosphere of the Coast, did not in width. The only exception was under the influence of the water of the 23rd June, when he ran 30 miles in the Park but was then compelled to run 5. 30' to get out of it. The Park was almost done by C. Bell's discovery. 31st Aug. 1861. Capt. Bell's Bay to the 10th to 13th of the same month, found it actually resting on this C. his boats could not pass it. on the 3rd of August 1861 the open W. was 8 square less than 20' wide. once he had to wait for an opening in it. at other times he had to force a passage by the aid of Gunpowder. 30' (50' in width) was a firm barrier of ice. the 24 Sept 1861 to the 11th 1862, when Mr. Bell left the coast. Navy Bay & travelled over ice to Beechey I.
