A rather curious—and to our ideas, says The Wide World Magazine, somewhat unpleasing—custom obtains in Spanish cemeteries. All round the burying ground a building is erected whose design can only be compared to that of a nest of pigeon-holes, often seen in postoffices and similar institutions. Each pigeon-hole is a tomb. When a person dies his relatives here a pigeon-hole for five years and the remains are placed inside. The end is then sealed up with mortar and a memorial tablet affixed on the outside. The lease of the pigeon-hole may be renewed at the end of five years, but if it is allowed to expire the tomb is unsealed and the bones removed to make way for another tenant. Needless to say the plan has some good points. The space taken up by the "pigeon-hole cemetery" is comparatively small, as is also the cost of burlal. Picturesqueness is however, conspicuously absent, nor is sontimen. conspicuously absent; nor is sentimental grief catered to, as it would be impossible to go and mourn at the grave of a person buried in a pigeon-sole so high up that a ladder is needed to reach it. Chinese Stores Business Methods

Curious Customs of the Tientsin and Pekin Shopkeepers.

The average Chinese shop of any kind in Tientsin and Pekin is a one-storey building without doors or windows to the street. The entire front is closed by shutters at night; in the daytime the shutters are removed. These shops are 14 to 16 feet wide on the street, and the room is not deeper than this. Three or is not deeper than this. Three of four feet back from the front a coun ter runs, behind which there is shelv

The storerooms are not deeper, because of the peculiar arrangement of Chinese houses. The typical Chinese house is only one-storey in height, and is built on all four sides of a square courtyard. If more room is needed, there is a second courtyard in the rear, with a communicating door, and so on. The yamens or official residences of the various Chinese officials of Tientsin are all erected in this way—one courtyard after another surrounded by buildings all opening into the court.

MINING COAL IN

Public View in Scranton, Pa.

Most city parks have their zoos museums, floral displays, band concerts and such things that make them as similar as two peas. But the honor of being distinctive, with a real and exclusive difference, belongs to Nay Aug Park of Scranton, Pa. Hence the visitor views with wonderment a real anthracite coal mine. And he does not have to go underground to see the coal seams and the mining operations—for it is a mine with the roof off.

Two miles or so down the valley there is a regular mine shaft with its hoisting plant and towering breaker, and from this shaft mining operations have been carried on in the same seams that either crop out in or under

the park.
The work has been done to accommodate certain persons who wanted the rocky biuff removed. Eventually the gangway from the far-away shaft will come out thru the face of the seam in the park, and then the coal will be hauled underground to the

breaker. The remaining rocky bluffs over the coal will be utilized by the large stone crusher plant, and the colliery will disappear, except that right in the centre of the park is a gated mine entrance, which is one of the permanent exhibits of the place. In this the visitor may follow the coal seam for some distance.
