

Charles Parrish claimed \$500 for injuries sustained in a collision at Colborne and Church streets between a street car and a lorry he was driving. He stated he was crossing the tracks when the car approached at a daugerous rate of speed, and striking his lorry injured him to such extent that he has been unable to attend to his work.
