The subject of this sketch, Donald Hector McLean, B.A., is the son of the late Hector McLean, merchant, he was born in 1865, educated in the Public Schools Ottawa, and at Woodstock (Ont.) College and University College, Toronto, graduated with honors in Modern Languages in 1893; studied law; called to the Bar in 1893, and is now practising his profession successfully, and has offices in Central Chambers, Elgin Street, Ottawa. On seeking municipal honor was elected Reeve in 1897, re-elected in 1898 and in 1899 by acclamation, a Liberal in politics. Mr. McLean has seen considerable of the world. In the summer of 1890 he crossed the Atlantic, working before the mast over and back, and when on the other side tramped and bicycled over considerable parts of England, Scotland and France for over three months; again in the summer and fall of 1894, he was in the Old Land wheeling—this time in France, Switzerland and Northern Italy. His notes of his experiences and adventures on both trips would, if committed to paper be very entertaining as those of a young Canadian's impressions of old world life, and it is to be hoped that some day they will be. Mr. McLean has been an ardent militiaman for some years—first joining as a private in K Company "Queen's Own," when at the University. He was given a lieutenants commission on the organization of the 48th Highlanders, and on coming to Ottawa again, in 1893, he transferred to The Governor General's Foot Guards, in which corps he is now a captain.
