the Commerce of this Isle will prove how right Mess. de Raudot were in their Opinion of the Advantages that might be made of it, by shewing what that Commerce actually was in 1723, only Nine or Ten Years after the Foundation of Louisburgh, when this Dictionary was first published. I should have been glad to have seen this Article continued down to the Year 1742, when the last Edition was printed. But the Editors own they wanted Materials upon the Affairs of America. We may reasonably judge, however, that the Article of Cape Breton, or Louisburgh, might have grown to be more than three Times (a) as considerable as we here see it. this Extract I shall add two or three from our own Writers, who made their Remarks on Occasion of the Acquisition of this Island to the Crown of Great Britain.

Extract from Savary's Distionaire de Commerce.

THE Colony of Louisburgh is more modern than that of Louisburgh is more monot having settled there till 1714, after they had ceded to the English the Port of Placentia, and the other Posts they held in Newfoundland, by the Treaty of Utrecht. This Isle formerly (b) belonged to France under the Name of Cape Breton, as making a Part of Canada.
