Citizens of Thamesville Will Also Mark Site of Battle of Moraviantown. CHATHAM, June 28.—(Special.)—The citizens of Thamesville have decided to erect a boulder on the battlefield of Moraviantown, to commemorate that important event in history, and also to establish a mark of esteem for the Indian Chief Tecumseh. John McDowell, on whose farm the site is situated, has donated sufficient ground for the erection of the boulder, and the citizens of Thamesville have already subscribed the funds, so that Kent County's greatest historical site will be plainly indicated. FORMED NEW CHURCH

Which Has Been Officially Recognized by Baptist Association. BROCKVILLE, June 28.—(Special.)—Owing to a split in the congregation of the First Baptist Church some months ago, the majority of the members and adherents withdrew and formed a new church, under the pastorate of Rev. S. J. Robins, who went out with them. A council composed of lay and clerical representatives of the 22 churches forming the Central Canada Baptist Association have just concluded a meeting here, at which the new church was officially recognized and extended the hand of fellowship. Officers have been elected and a name will be decided upon at a congregational meeting to be held later. Preparations are being made for the building of an edifice.

LITTLE BOY CRUSHED

Harry Maynard Met Death Under Ice Cream Wagon. Five-year-old Harry Maynard, who lived at the head of Dufferin-street, was crushed to death beneath the wheels of one of Neilson's ice cream wagons at Dufferin Heights, Wednesday afternoon. He had climbed on the wagon when an order was being delivered and when the wagon started up was caught by the wheel and went around with it. Finally he was thrown off and the wheel passed over his head. A clerk from a nearby store picked up the little fellow and carried him home, where he died shortly afterward. TROOPER'S LEG BROKEN

Charles Hook—of Mississauga Horse Victim of Kick. Trooper Charles Hook of the Mississauga Horse, whose home is in Barrie, was brought to the city from Grimsby yesterday by the steamer Argyle. His leg was broken by a kick from Sgt.-Major Telfor's horse, which became unmanageable on the march from Niagara camp to the city, and while plunging broke Hook's leg. The man was met at the wharf by F. W. Matthews' private ambulance and taken to the General Hospital. The casualties at the camp now number ten and the men will require to be moved in ambulances upon their arrival in the city to-day, and Matthews' ambulance has been ordered to meet the boat upon which they will be brought across.
