

300 HORSES AT WOODBINE PARK

Steeplechasers Show Fine Form
Thru the Field—J. W. Schorr

Part in Meeting.

Practically every prominent turfman that participated in the meetings on the Canadian circuit, this season, are ready on hand for the opening of the Ontario Jockey Club at the Woodbine on Sat. day, with the exception of August Belmont, R. E. Watkins and a few minor players. Fully three hundred horses are now quartered on the grounds of the association, while several of the stables that raced at the half mile are among those in attendance.

It is possible that the stable of the Memphis brewer, John W. Schorr, leading winner-owner on the circuit this season, will, like at previous meetings, play an important part in the meeting at the Woodbine. John Schorr, who has worked well since arriving at the course, it is probable that Robert D. Schorr, who has been in the running of the business since the death of his father, will be in the saddle on the day of the opening.

The timber tappers were schooled yesterday and performed most creditably. There were lots of doing during the time allotted, and the many jumpers going try the field made a splendid spectacle. It is predicted that the steeplechasing at the autumn meeting will be of a high order.

DETROIT, Sept. 13.—The Grand Circuit races were postponed today on account of rain.

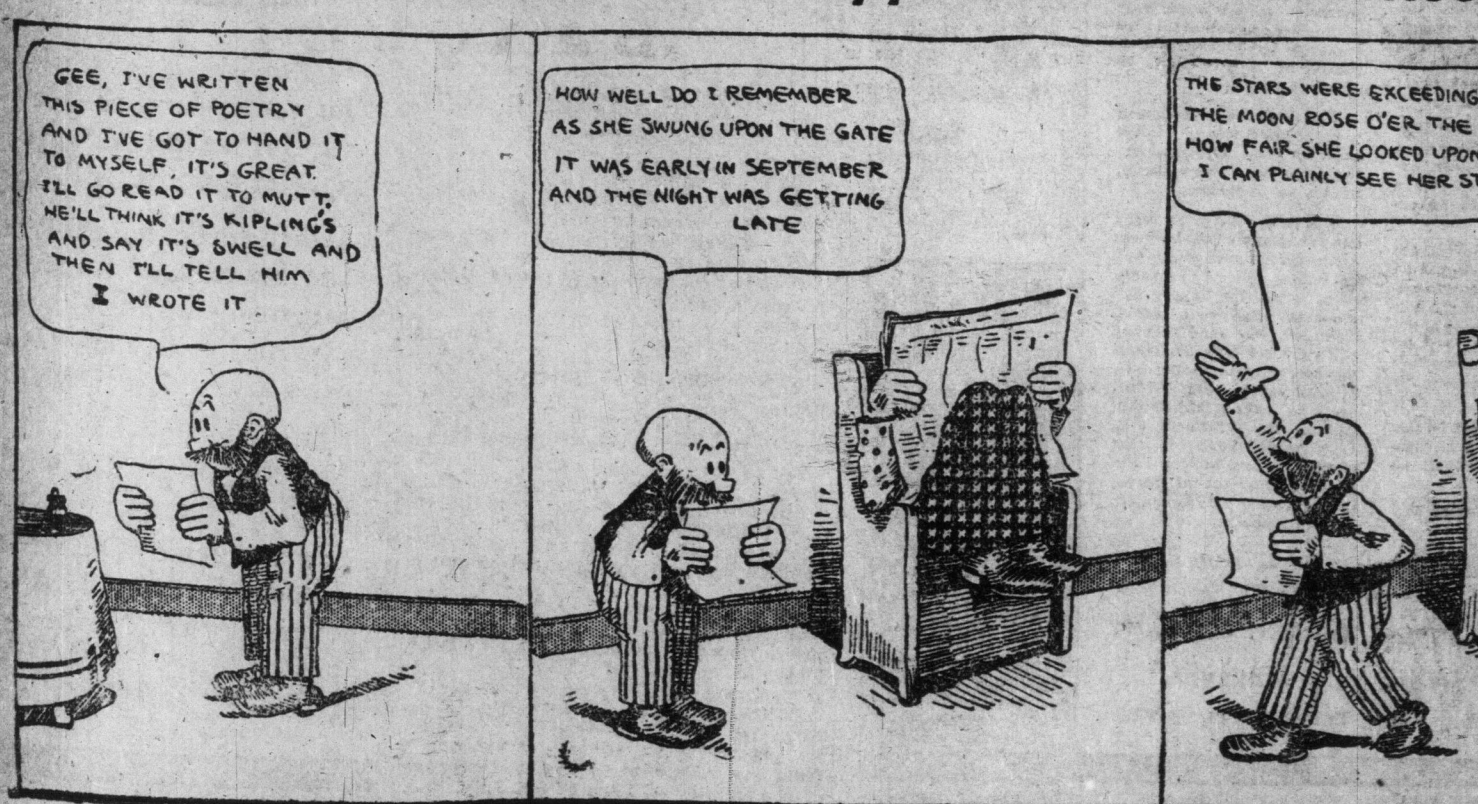
