BATTLE LOWER  
IN MONTREAL

Prices Reduced 25c to 50c  
Per Cwt. — Hogs Easy but  
Supply Was Small and  
Values Held.

MONTREAL, Nov. 11.—At the Montreal  
Stock Yards, West End market, the re-  
sult of live stock for the week ended  
Nov. 8, was: 2500 cattle, 4000 sheep and  
lambs, 2000 hogs and 600 calves. The of-  
fering on the market this morning were  
2500 cattle, 1500 sheep and lambs, 2000 hogs  
and 300 calves.

A weaker feeling developed in the mar-  
ket for cattle this morning and prices  
declined. The 2500 cattle, as compared  
with a week ago, was a good one, as  
demand was fairly good for best stock  
and sales of full loads of choice steers  
averaged from \$5.75 to \$6.00, and good  
steers and heifers weighing from 900 to  
1000 lbs. each, brought \$5.25 to \$5.50, and  
medium, \$4.75 to \$5.00. The price paid for  
cows of choice steers was \$5.25. The  
supply of culling stock was fairly large,  
for which the demand was good and an  
active trade was done in this line at \$2  
to \$2.75 for cows and at \$1 to \$1.50 for  
bulls.

There was no change in the condition of  
the market for small cattle, prices being  
firm under a good demand and as the  
supply was fairly large an active trade  
was done. Ontario lambs sold at \$5.50 to  
\$6.00 and Quebec at \$5.75 to \$6.00 per  
cwt. The demand for calves was good and  
sales of milked stock were made at \$5  
to \$6 and grass fed at \$4.50 to \$5 per  
cwt. An easy feeling prevailed in the market  
for hogs, but as the supply was smaller  
than usual prices showed little change  
as compared with a week ago, sales of  
medium, \$5.25 to \$5.50; common, \$5.00 to  
\$5.25; and grass fed at \$4.50 to \$5 per  
cwt. Butcher's cattle, choice, \$5.75 to  
\$6.00; medium, \$5.25 to \$5.50; and cull-  
ing, \$4.75 to \$5.00. Cows, \$5.00 to \$5.25;  
canners, \$3 to \$3.50; choice cows, \$4.75  
to \$5.00; medium, \$4.25 to \$4.50; bulls, \$3.75  
to \$4.00; cullers, \$3.25 to \$3.50; com-  
mon and medium, each, \$70 to \$80; spring-  
ers, \$85 to \$90.

Sheep—Quebec, \$2.75 to \$3; bucks and culls,  
\$2.25 to \$2.50; lambs, \$3.75 to \$4.00.  
Hogs—F.O.B., \$15.00 to \$15.50.  
Calves—\$2 to \$3.

CITY CATTLE MARKET.  
The railways reported 15 car loads of  
live stock at the City Market, comprising  
100 cattle, 20 hogs, 200 sheep and lambs  
and 5 calves.

Trade was reported to be fairly  
good, as the demand for feeder steers  
has eased off since the distillery buyers  
have all nearly got supplied.

James Armstrong bought 10 milkers and  
Springers at \$11 each. Mr. Armstrong also  
got 60 milkers and springers of top qual-  
ity last week, which he sold to one mil-  
ler at an average of \$70 each.

W. J. Paddy bought 1500, 900 to 1000  
lbs. each, at \$1.75 to \$2; 1500, at \$1.50,  
and 1500, at \$1.25.

Two cars were selling at \$6.25 per cwt.  
W. J. Paddy bought for his stock 200  
car loads of cattle, canners, at \$2 to  
\$2.50 per cwt.; cows, \$3.50 to \$4.00; steers,  
at \$2.25 to \$2.50; and 200 car loads of

NEW HAVEN RAIL-  
WAY OF GRAND TRUNK

Canadian Road Plans Exten-  
sive Invasion of Eastern  
States—Work on  
Branch Line Stops.

BOSTON, Nov. 11.—(Can. Press.)—  
The Grand Trunk Railway of Canada  
is negotiating with the New York,  
New Haven and Hartford Railroad for  
the right not only to reach Boston and  
Providence over the lines of the lat-  
ter road, but to carry its business into  
all the stations of the entire New Ha-  
ven system, including the Boston and  
Maine roads, according to a statement  
given out by Vice-President Timothy  
E. Byrnes of the New Haven road, to-  
night.

The statement is issued to explain  
the reasons for continuing work on  
the Southern New England Railroad,  
the Grand Trunk's subsidiary, as an-  
nounced yesterday.

Vice-President Byrnes stated that  
already an agreement has been reach-  
ed between the two roads for the joint  
use of the Central Vermont tracks be-  
tween White River Junction and  
Windsor. The withdrawal of the peti-  
tion by the Boston and Maine for a  
branch road from Claremont to Leba-  
non, N. H., paralleling the Central Ver-  
mont, was announced Saturday.

While it is stated that the exact rea-  
son for ordering a suspension of work  
on the Southern New England Rail-  
way is not known to President Mellen,  
it is admitted that joint negotia-  
tions are under way and have been for  
some time looking to a joint use of the New  
Haven lines by the New Haven and  
Grand Trunk roads.

The statement of Vice-President  
Byrnes is as follows:  
"Vice-President Byrnes has talked  
over the telephone this evening with  
Mr. Mellen at his residence in Stock-  
bridge, and has been assured by Mr.  
Mellen that there has been no agree-  
ment of any description yet arrived at  
with the Grand Trunk Railway, except  
as to the joint use of Central Vermont  
tracks between Windsor and White  
River Junction."

Onus on Grand Trunk.  
Mr. Mellen has been at various times  
in communication with Mr. Chamber-  
lin, and thinks it probable that an  
agreement as to traffic will also be  
made, but that there has been no un-  
derstanding, expressed or implied, with  
regard to the Southern New England  
extension, and if the Grand Trunk has  
discontinued this work, as stated in  
the newspapers, it was because the  
Grand Trunk believed it advisable  
from its own standpoint to discon-  
tinue this work, as there has been no  
understanding between itself and the  
New Haven road.

The facts are, the New Haven  
road has not paid and will not pay one  
dollar to the Grand Trunk to stop the  
construction of the Southern New  
England road. All negotiations with  
the Grand Trunk have been open and  
above board from the beginning, and  
will so continue until the end.

CONTRACT NOT SIGNED.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 11.—  
(Can. Press.)—President C. S. Mellen  
of the New Haven system authorizes  
the statement that negotiations have  
been in progress for several months  
looking to a traffic agreement with the  
Grand Trunk, and it may be that in  
connection with that, the Grand Trunk  
has seen fit to stop work on the South-  
ern New England. The contract, how-  
ever, relating to the traffic agreement,  
has not been signed.
