**MOTORMAN FAILED** TO RING HIS GONG

No One Blamed for Dorothy Stevenson's Death, in Jury's Verdict.

**USED DOOR AS SEAT** 

Cadets Had Been Drinking, But Car's Driver Had Not.

That the death of Dorothy Stevenson was an accident pure and simple, was the verdict of Coroner Elliott's jury at the morgue last night. The jury added that they thought the motorman of the street car which figured in the collision should have sounded his gong; and that in their opinion had the automobile not been so crowded, Miss Stevenson would not have been sitting on the edge of the door, as she was when the fatal accident occurred. Miss Stevenson was killed in a collision between an east bound King st car and an automobile driven by Carlton E. Raefield, about midnight on Sun day, March 10. There were seven neo ple in the automobile, a five-passenger car, besides the driver and Miss Steson. Four people sat in the front seat, and five in the rear seat. Miss tevenson was sitting on the edge of

a rear door. The motor car came south on Brookfield street and had just turned whist on Queen street, when it collided with the street car. Miss Ste venson was thrown out and killed, while the other occupants of the car suffered minor injuries. Raefield is now charged with manslaughter in con-

nection with the accident.
