New York, Sept. 20.—That \$235,000 has been paid by the New York Life Insurance Company to Andrew A. Hamilton of Albany; that no account of this money has been made, except that Hamilton attends sessions of the legislature at Albany in the interest of the New York Life Insurance Company, was brought out to-day by testimony given by McCall before the legislative insurance investigating committee.

Mr. McCall said that the various sums making up the \$235,000 paid to Hamilton had been given him in connection with different real estate deals, but that he had never made any account of the money had been actually applied to such deals. 
Quiet Anti-Peace Meeting. Resolutions Asking Cabinet to Resign Passed at Tokio.
