BERNHARDT IN ACCIDENT.

Engine Leaves Rails and Actress Declares It is "Hoodooed." Topaka, Kas., May 25.—It is announced from the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific officers in this city that the special train carrying Sarah Bernhardt and her company, met with an accident to the trucks of one of the cars near Mankato, this afternoon, delaying the train two hours and twenty minutes.

The Bernhardt Company has an engagement in St. Joseph, Mo., to-night. The train dispatcher at this point says the wreck was not a serious one, that the train would reach St. Joseph at 8.30 o'clock, according to present figures. Miss Bernhardt seemed much excited, and ran back and forth between her car and the locomotive. She demanded a new locomotive, even after the derailed engine was replaced on the tracks. She claimed the locomotive was "hoodooed" and refused to permit her train to go ahead.

The railroad was "blocked" several hours. The tender of the locomotive of her train ran along the ties half a mile, the locomotive finally leaving the rails, but remaining upright.

HAPPENINGS IN HAMILTON

YOUNG SOLDIER'S FATAL SLIP

Corporal Briggs of 91st Regiment Killed at Dundas — Herbie Barr is Reinstated.

Hamilton, May 25.—(Special.)—The finance committee settled the dispute over Herbie Barr this evening by recommending his reinstatement to his former position in the city clerk's office, but it gave the city clerk power to dismiss him if his services do not prove satisfactory. Mr. Barr refused to consider a proposition to accept a position in the tax office.

The committee endorsed the invitation to the King to visit Canada, and recommended the council to issue \$25,000 debentures for the addition to the Westworth-street School. No action was taken on the Hamilton Health Association application for a grant for the free dispensary it wants to establish for consumptives, because the aldermen claimed that they had not enough information on the subject.

The founding of the Smart Turner Company was slightly damaged by fire this evening. This evening a horse attached to a rig containing the eight-year-old son of C. H. Shea galloped from Kent St. to Thomson's law office around the centre of the city. It was stopped before any damage was done either to the boy or rig.

The board of works this afternoon decided to lay a new plank flooring on the high level bridge at a cost of \$300. A. Baird was elected as acting chairman. The city engineer said that there was just as great a demand for cement walks as there had been last year. The street lighting contract will be discussed at the next meeting of the board.

Twenty structural iron workers employed by the Hamilton Bridge Works Company on the Bank of Hamilton Building went out on strike today because a non-union man from Detroit was put to work on the job.

Edwin W. Briggs, Dundas, a corporal of the 91st Highlanders, met his death this morning while the regiment was returning from a training trip. He was employed as a hard-wear clerk, and when the train passed his town he jumped off, the train was traveling at the rate of 20 or 25 miles an hour. He did not get out of the car railing soon enough, and was dragged under the wheels. The last car on the train passed over the lower part of his body, and he was frightfully mangled. He lived only a few minutes after the accident.

Hon. Frank Cochrane will visit the city Saturday, and it is expected that he will settle the dispute about the beach. It is said that he will cancel the bargain made between the city and the Toronto and Niagara Power Company on the ground that the city is not getting enough for the right of way.

Patients who want to enter the consumption sanitarium will be examined at the relief officer's office in the city hall Saturday morning. Dr. Roberts, the medical health officer, has taken steps to compel the doctors to report all cases of consumption that come under his notice.

A Big Shipment. The British Columbia Electric Railway Co. of Vancouver have purchased one generator of 2000 horse-power (3 phase, 7200 alternations, 200 revolutions per minute engine type, revolving field, for direct connection to water wheel); 1 rotary converter (1500 horse-power, 550 volts, 3 phase, 7200 alternations, 400 revolutions per minute); 8 air blast transformers (each 735 horse-power, 2200 volts to 24,200 volts, 7200 alternations, together with necessary switchboards, regulating and controlling devices from the Canadian Westinghouse Co. at Hamilton. The apparatus is to provide additional power for the rapidly increasing demand in Vancouver and vicinity. This is the fourth generator of this size supplied by the Westinghouse Company to those people, and other three being furnished by the Pittsburgh works previous to the building of the Hamilton factory. This is the largest electric generator ever manufactured in Canada, and was shipped today.

TRUSTEES ASK CONTROLLERS FOR QUITE A LOT OF MONEY

To Establish New Technical School — Can't Flush the Streets — Notes From the City Hall.

Greetings were exchanged between the board of education and the board of control yesterday. The former body want \$200,000 for a new technical school and site. Trustee Parkinson said a government grant of \$5000 was assured and that would pay the interest on \$125,000 of the money. Controller Ward suggested that the controllers take up the matter in detail with the trustees on Wednesday afternoon, June 5, to exclusion of other business, and this was decided upon.

Jarvis St. Pavement. The controllers had another visit from Ewart Farquhar regarding resurfacing of Jarvis-street pavement. He consented not to put in his petition against it on condition that should the city change its policy in regard to repairs and renewals, as suggested by him, the property owners on Jarvis-street should get the best of it.

The flushing of asphalt pavements is useless owing to their present condition, and Dr. Shear has so reported to the board of control. Don't Want the Contract. The board will again advertise for tenders for the structural steel work at the new engine house, for the high pressure system. McGregor & McIntyre refused to execute the contract owing to the clauses composing item 1 to pay prevailing rate of wages and not to engage men who had been in the city for less than six months.

The city solicitor asked instructions from the board to issue a writ against William Mackenzie, in connection with the latter's claims regarding ownership of Edmund-street, but further efforts will first be made to come to an understanding.

The Continental Life Insurance Company was granted a lease of a 12-foot lane between the medical building and registry office, on Richmond-street, for 21 years at \$350 per year. Baseball vs. Cricket. The park commissioner will report upon a complaint from the young men of Westmoreland Methodist Church and the Centennial Methodist Church that cricketers monopolize Dovecourt Park and they are precluded from playing baseball.

Vermont-avenue, from Bathurst-street to Palmerston-avenue, has been made a residential district by the board of control. W. H. Townsend objects to the city expropriating 800 feet of his land on Roxboro-street for park purposes. His solicitor, E. B. Ryckman, appeared before the board of control and said the lots were worth much more than the city would pay. The controllers took no action pending a concise communication from Mr. Ryckman. They will likely visit the locality.

Training Tower. Chief Thompson of the fire department and City Architect McCallum have returned from Detroit, after inspecting a new training tower, which is proposed to add to the equipment of the central fire station. Scaling ladders are used when the ordinary ladders can't reach the highest stories of a building. The tower is used to train firemen in the use of ladders. With it, the firemen can be made more expert in falling into lifesaving nets. It will be recommended.
