Specialty A SUCCESSFUL SNOW PLOW.

In view of the breakdown of the city and most of the Suburban Street Railway systems under the stress of the late storm, it will be of public in-

terest to learn that one, the Metropolitan Street Railway made a successful fight of it. There was a continuous service on this line all Thursday night and the day following until late in the afternoon, when a telephone wire falling across the trolley wire about 20 feet from the southern terminus of the trock caused a short circuit which he from the southern terminus of the track, caused a short circuit, which necessitated the closing down for about one and a half hours of the engines in the piwer house near Mount Pleasant Cemetery. At the end of this time the snow plows of the cars almost immediately cleared a passage, and it has been open ever since. A World reporter sent, up to learn the methods employed by the company, was, through the kindness of one of the officials, shown the modus operandi of the plow, which is the invention of a North Toronto man, is a very simple looking affair, being a long concave steel blade

fair, being a long concave steel blade of about 10 feet in length, fastened to knuckle-jointed bars. It differs from the ordinary idea as found in from the ordinary idea as found in snow plows, in that no motion of the car is imparted to it, and that it always presents a level clearing surface to the rail. The plow and all its attachments weigh less than 150 pounds, and can be placed in position or taken off in from three to five minutes. another advantage is that its at-ment to the car does not perceptibly hinder its speed, so that passen-gers can be carried from place to place at the same time that the track is being cleared. During Friday's storm, drifts in some spots of three feet in depth were thrown aside, and this with-out the use of a single sweeper.

"A Loyal Lot of Men," He Said-Hint That There May be Breakers Ahead for the New Mauager-Sir William Van Horne Will Not Leave the C.P.R. Yet-Large Increase in Earnings. Montreal, Jan. 27 .- Those who pre-

dicted that Mr. E. P. Hannaford would strike back at Mr. Hays in retiring from the position of chief engineer of the Grand Trunk were in the wrong, as the following document will "Montreal, Jan. 24, 1896.

Mr. Hannaford, however, hinted that there might be breakers ahead, and that the position of the newly-appointed general manager would not be anything like a bed of roses. It was likely that most a bed of roses. It was likely that most of the present men would be replaced by Americans, yet he hoped the Lord would look after the Grand Trunk.

A good deal of comment was indulged in at the Point to-day over the statement in The Chicago Railway Age, which said that Mr. E. F. McQuiggan had not accepted the general managership of the Great Northern, as had been reported, but was going to Montreal to become superintendent of the Grand Trunk. An effort was made to find out what truth there might be in find out what truth there might be in this rumor, but as most of the head of-ficials were at Ottawa, no headway

could be made.

The Canadian Pacific.

It is now said that Sir William Van Horne will not leave the Canadian Pacific until the road's earning capacity has been made sure, and the stockholders are getting back a good interest on their investment. There appears, in fact, to be good times close at hand for the big road. To-morrow the monthly statement for December will be issued. Computing the past month, as stated above, with the reports of the remaining eleven months, will make the fotal net earnings of the year \$7,371,000, an increase of \$948,000 over the year 1894.

Detectives went to Lefebvre's house and found several of the stolen articles, and placed Lefebvre under arrest. Lefebvre confessed that Schmallz had brought the articles up Saturday night. The police then went to arrest Schmallz and intercepted a letter from Lefebvre, warning Schmallz that the detectives were after him. When Schmallz was arrested a letter addressed to Lefebvre, asking him not to say that he got the stolen antiques from him, was found on him. Both men were arraigned in court this morning, and remanded, to enable the detectives to find where the stolen antiques are stored. Three pieces only were recovered at Lefebvre's place.

Among the antique rings stolen were a number dating back to 400 years before Christ. There were also some antique watches, dating back to the years 1550 to 1680 and 1700 some Vene.
