PROTECTION FOR THE EMPIRE

The increasing clamor for protection by English manufacturers and agriculturists has emboldened Mr. Chamberlain, Secretary of State for the Colonies, to recommend the application of the protective principle to the Empire. Of late many meetings have been held in different parts of Great Britain, at which resolutions have been unanimously carried, demanding from the Government a certain amount of protection for farm and manufacturing products. There is scarcely an industry which claims that it is not injured by the influx of the foreign goods. One of the great manufacturers says that if he had his home market the wages he pays would be raised from fifteen to twenty-five per cent. Besides agricultural deputations which called upon the Government, there was an immense deputation from the manufacturers a couple of weeks ago.

Mr. Henry Fowler, an eminent free trader, in a letter that appeared yesterday in the Graphic, says the spirit of protection is growing so formidable in England that the battle of protection and free trade will have to be fought over again. Mr. Chamberlain perceives that the struggle is about to commence, and he has already ranged himself on the popular side. This action on the part of the Secretary of State is, as the despatches say, a fact of the first importance. Mr. Chamberlain is represented as having encouraged Cobdenism and burned his boats behind him. He is, in the first place, in the next place, he considers it an essential condition of such solvency that Great Britain should consent to replace the import duties on articles which were largely produced in the colonies. The schedule which he suggested comprised wheat, meat, wool, sugar and other articles of enormous consumption in England, which he wholly produced by British labor.

The proposal involves the protection idea pure and simple. It is needless to say, if a reasonable duty is placed on American and other foreign wheat, pork and food products, that Canada will immensely profit thereby. Canada can probably afford to abandon her local protection to some extent if she is made a participant in the enormous benefits that will accrue from the application of the principle to the Imperial tariff.

If Mr. Laurier's free trade bug is not dead already, the foremost living statement in favor of protection ought to effectually kill it.
