St. John's, Nid., Nov. 14.—The ministeri-al party has been defeated in the bye-elec-tions in the divisions of St. John's and For-tune Bay, the Liberals carrying the former by a majority of 435 and the latter by a majority of 117. The Government has thus lost three elections this year.
