OVERCOME BY GAS.

Employees in the St. Clair Tunnel Came Near Suffocating

Sarnia, Ont., Feb. 20.—A freight train that was being hauled west from the hole, and as a result one or more employees of the company came very near losing their lives.

After the forward part of the train had been taken out the engine was sent back into the tunnel to pick up the remaining portions of the train.

While the men were trying to accomplish this object, Conductor J. Way and brakeman A. Short and Thomas McGrath were overcome by the fumes.

He also became affected by the fumes. He was taken out of the tunnel and attended to by the men.

However, he had gone into the tunnel before the train, and was performing his duties, when he felt himself being overcome, as he rang the electric alarm bell, which gave the alarm to the men at the tunnel pump house.

As soon as the alarm sounded John Young and Charles Motion hurried into the tunnel, and found Mr. Forbes lying unconscious about 1800 feet from the entrance on this side.

They carried him out to fresh air, and a doctor was called.

The doctor worked over him for nearly two hours before he regained consciousness, and was considered out of danger.

He was removed to his home and at noon was in a fair way to recovery.

He had a very close call for his life, as a very few minutes longer inhaling the poisonous gas would have undoubtedly proved fatal.

CANADIAN ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS.

Annual Meeting Commenced Yesterday—Down on Special Attractions.

Upwards of 75 delegates were present at the annual meeting of the Canadian Association of Fairs and Exhibitions, which opened yesterday afternoon in the Council chamber at the old Court House, Mr. J. P. W. Hodson, Live Stock Commissioner of Ottawa, read an instructive paper on "The Improvement of the Agricultural Fair System in the Province of Ontario."

In dealing with the subject, Mr. Hodson suggested some reforms in the management of agricultural exhibitions, principal among which was a proposal to unite the Farmers' Institute system and fair systems under one management.

In connection with the reforms suggested, Mr. Hodson advocated the appointment of an independent committee to make a study of the various associations which are now in existence.

Many of the ideas were warmly endorsed, however, opposition to the proposal to unite the Farmers' Institute and fair systems, on the ground that it would be too cumbersome an undertaking, was referred to a special committee, who will report at the annual meeting.

The subject of special attractions at exhibitions was ably dealt with in a paper by Mr. John Burns, Windsor, Mr. Burns declared there was at present an unworkable system of exhibition, and he believed it would take considerable time to coordinate the various fairs.

Mr. Hodson also advocated the expulsion of special attractions from all fairs.

The financial statement, presented by Alex. McFarlane of Ottawa, showed a balance on hand of about \$200, and a preliminary committee was appointed to draft a constitution for the association.

The meeting was adjourned until the 23rd inst., when the annual meeting of the Queen Victoria, which will be held when the meeting is resumed this morning.

CHASE OF DEWEET

WILL SOON END, IT IS THOUGHT

Close Pursuit is Slowly, But Surely, Wearing Out His Forces.

HOPES HAVE BEEN FOILED.

Expected Aid From the Cape Dutch Has Not Been Realized Up to the Present.

KEPT CONSTANTLY ON THE MOVE.

Britisher Who Was a Prisoner With Him Says His Men and Horses Are Worked Out.

New York, Feb. 20.—The Sun's special military writer says: If the official and non-official but censored despatches from the Cape Dutch are to be believed, the South African army, after skillful evasions of the British forces north of the Orange River, who were trying to head him off from crossing into Cape Colony, he passed it at a point where he was not expected, and made direct for Philippstown, which he reached on the 15th inst.

There he had a running skirmish with a British force, but escaped from Gen. Bruce Hamilton, who was unable to overtake him owing to a sudden rise in the Orange River.

From Philippstown Gen. Dewet struck due west and, after destroying the railway track north and south of Barmans's Sidings, about half way between De Aar and the Orange River, he crossed the railway after having suffered some loss, principally in ammunition. His command seems to have divided, part going southwest into the Bristow district and the rest toward the Orange River, where they probably expect to be joined by the commandos from Beuchuanaland to which Gen. Methuen was reported a few days ago as ineffectually giving chase.

According to the censored despatches from Cape Town the commandos have moved north, and will not doubt join Gen. Dewet, who will act according to the tenor of the reports he receives from his commandos.

The Dutch Afrikaners, and the progress of a rising. So far, the information allowed to come out does not favor belief in a general uprising of the Dutch population, there is little doubt of their being entirely in sympathy with the invaders, who probably expect to be joined by the commandos from Beuchuanaland to which Gen. Methuen was reported a few days ago as ineffectually giving chase.

The region in which Gen. Dewet is now has already been passed over several times by both parties during the conflict, and may, therefore, be supposed to be nearly destitute of supplies, unless as has been done elsewhere, secret depots have been made to provide against the present emergency. In any case the further he goes west and southwest the more difficult it will be for Lord Kitchener and his forces to follow him, and on account of the very rough nature of the country and the difficulty of transport.

A British officer who was a prisoner with Gen. Dewet for several days after the Beaufort disaster gives a graphic account in a London paper of the way in which he moved his commando apart, some of the marches lasting more than twenty-four hours without more than one or two hours' rest. Every Boer was mounted and many were accompanied by his Kaffir boy, who was mounted and led one or more horses, besides carrying spare ammunition and sometimes a rifle. The Kaffirs attended to the harnessing and outfitting of the trains of Cape carts and wagons, which the Boers looked after the security of the laager. The guns with Gen. Dewet were under the charge of a German, who was well up to his business. The marches were made straight across country without any regard to the lines of communication, and the British had to be eluded, and the laagers were always in such positions that an enemy might pass at a mile's distance without discovering them.

In the Transvaal the corralling of the Boers by Gen. French is now acknowledged to have failed, some of the commandos passing around his flanks, while one slipped thru the British line. The work there, therefore, has to begin again in the north, while Lord Kitchener is devoting himself to the pursuit of Gen. Dewet in Cape Colony.

What Caused Emilio's Death?

Coroner A. J. Johnson last night issued a warrant for an inquest to be held tomorrow afternoon on the body of Francis Emilio, who died suddenly yesterday morning at his home, 109 Parliament-street. Emilio had been ailing for some months, and early yesterday morning he was found lying in a semi-conscious condition in his room by members of his family. A physician was called for, but before he arrived the man was dead. Under the circumstances the doctor declined to issue a burial certificate and referred the whole matter to Coroner Johnson for investigation. A post-mortem examination will be made to-day. Emilio was 62 years of age and was a chronic invalid, carrying on business at 124 Victoria-street. He leaves a grown-up family.
