ASSESSMENT OF CORPORATIONS.

Loss Argument Was Heard and
Judgment Reserved.

Judge McDougall of York County, Judge
McGibbon of Peel County presided jointly
at the hearing of the assessment appeals
of the Toronto Railway Co., Toronto Electric
Light Co., Toronto Landmark Light
Co. and the Bell Telephone Co. yesterday
afternoon. After a lengthy argument for
each side judgment was reserved.

The companies contend that the recent
legislation has not altered the scrap
assessment law, as laid down in the case of
the Bell Telephone Company of Hamilton
and the Queen's Hotel bridge case.

The contention of the city is that the
property of each company should be valued
as a whole, and that such was the intention
of the recent legislation.

Nearly two hundred of lawyers are
involved in this difference of opinion as to
assessment, and the amount of taxes on
this sum is approximately \$40,000. The
companies appealed against the Toronto
Electric Light Co., Toronto Landmark Light
Co. and the Bell Telephone Co. Mr. J. B. Mc
Gibbon, of the Toronto Electric Light Co.,
is on his feet, and is arguing the case.

Colombian Troops and Rebels Are
Now Preparing for the
Final Struggle.

BOTH ARMIES WELL EQUIPPED

Costa Rica Head of Insurgent Gov-
ernment-Colon and Panama
Crowded With Soldiers.

Chicago, Oct. 14.—The steamer arriving
from Boca del Toro brings the news that
the Colombian government troops and re-
bels are getting the arms and ammu-
nition they need. The German steam-
er Valencia reached Boca with 20,000
Mauzer rifles, recently purchased in Europe
by Colombia, and a million rounds of am-
munition, and a number of other cargoes
are expected.

Most of the supplies and munitions of
war for the insurgents are being sent
from Costa Rica. The head of the insurgent
government is at present at San Jose, the
capital of Costa Rica, and is finding it
difficult in getting the guns and ammu-
nition smuggled over the frontier, which is
a dense swamp.

The indications are that both sides are
being fed by the government, which has
been going on for several months, and
are enlisting new men. Colon and Panama
are reported crowded with soldiers. The Col-
ombian government has secured a large
quantity of arms and ammunition from the
General Postoffice, from which they expect
good results. The Oia, the vessel which
carried the arms to the insurgents, is re-
ported to have been captured by the govern-
ment, and the arms are being sent to the
insurgents by the Oia.

The government has selected all boats be-
longing to natives and armed soldiers who
belonging to foreign firms for patrol duty
along the coast. A boat belonging to the
firm of Brown, Braden & Co. was seized
and sent to Colon a few days ago. One
of the owners, Braden, objected, and
the boat was released, and the arms were
sent to the insurgents by the Oia.
