

SNAP-SHOTS AT VARIOUS SPORTS

Today's Rugby match at Dundas, between the pigskin artists of that place and our own tallenders, will settle all arguments as to whether it will be Dundas or the Hamilton Cubs who play off for the Dominion championship in the intermediate class with the Argos. The race this season between the Cubs and the Valley crowd has been very close. Up to date the Cubs have defeated Dundas twice, the first time by a score of 29-0, and later by a score of 15 to 11. Dundas has met the local team but once this season, and the game resulted in a victory for the Valley aggregation by a score of 15-2. The Cubs were walloped to the tune of 13 to 6 in the first struggle with Dundas, but managed to turn the tables in last Saturday's game when they won out by a score of 7 to 6. If Dundas loses today's game it will be out of the race entirely.

In the six O. R. F. U. championship games played this season the Hamilton Senior Tigers have scored 30 touchdowns, of which Moore has converted 29 and made seven. Stuart, while very popular in the Smoky Village, is not the most gentle player in the world. Hod's slashing record is a few notches above par, and he's young yet.

Mr. A. M. Edwards, of Galt, will be a candidate for the O. H. A. executive this season. Mr. Edwards is well known in hockey circles, having been connected with the O. H. A. in an indirect manner for several years. He is well liked throughout the west, and would be an acquisition to the association.—Toronto News.

How different is the tale of the present season on the gridiron from that of past seasons under the old rules. It was at one time quite the fad for a big team to go through an entire season without being scored upon. There is no clean slate among the big elevens now. West Point daubed Yale's and Princeton left an unmistakable smudge on Dartmouth's. They were the only teams that had not been scored against up to Saturday last. The Hamilton Tigers have participated in but one whitewashing bee this season, and that was the slaughter of the Peterboro innocents, the final score being Tigers 36, Peterboro 0.

The auction sale of boxes at the disposal of Pennsylvania for the Army and Navy game, Dec. 1, took place at Philadelphia. It was a decidedly interesting feature of the football season. Not very many persons attended the sale, but those who were there meant business and were willing to spend real money. There were 32 boxes to be sold, and it took twenty minutes to dispose of the lot for a lump sum of \$3,230.

The Army-Navy gridiron contests always draw immense throngs, and President Roosevelt generally finds time to attend and root as loud as the loudest of rooters.

Harry Lewis, Philadelphia's great in-and-out boxer, has signed to meet Mike Ward, of Sarnia. Mike had the championship bee buzzing in his bonnet at one time, but Joe Gans ended the buzzing by stopping the Sarnia boy in ten rounds, at Detroit, a couple of years ago. Since then, however, Ward has improved considerably, and, among other good men, he recently whipped Jack O'Keefe, of Chicago. The bout should prove to be a good drawing card, and will no doubt be a clever go.

New York Sun: "After watching the game closely so far this season," says Dr. Hutchins, coach at Wisconsin, and a graduate physician, "I am convinced the new rules are beneficial to the players, for the reason that, though they tend to increase minor injuries, such as broken bones and strained tendons, the percentage of fatalities will be decreased greatly. I believe most of the injuries will be broken bones and twisted knee joints. The broken bones will come largely from being thrown hard in open field running, when a runner is tackled and thrown. The knee twists will come, I figure, more in the end runs and other line plays generally used this year."

FATAL ACCIDENT TO JOCKEY SEWELL

One of Best-Known Riders Dies of Injuries Received in a Race.

New York, Nov. 10.—L. Sewell, one of the best-known jockeys on the American turf, died last night at home of his mother at Sheepshead Bay, as the result of injuries sustained in the sixth race at Aqueduct race track yesterday.

Sewell had the mount on W. S. House's bay horse Lightness. He had the horse in fifth position at the half mile post, where there was considerable crowding, and being on the inside position he was thrown on the rail. The jockey lay helpless, and for a time the spectators in the grandstand thought he was dead. The track ambulance was called, and the injured rider was conveyed to the jockey's room. Examination by the track physician indicated that Sewell was only stunned, and no bones had been broken. The prediction being made that he would be seen in the saddle in a few days.

He was then taken to his home. There he complained of extreme pain in his head and body, and he soon sank into an unconscious state. A doctor of Sheepshead Bay was called and found that the jockey was suffering from internal injuries, and that his life was in peril. A doctor from Brooklyn was called in for consultation, and they worked over the jockey from half past 6 o'clock until fifteen minutes 11, when he died.

The horse Lightness on which Sewell had the mount was an inferior type of thoroughbred, and odds of 100 to 1 were laid against its chances yesterday.

CAREER SHORT, BUT TROUBLOUS

Western Intercollegiate Athletic Union in Difficulties—Charge Against Colleges.

Woodstock, Nov. 9.—The Western Intercollegiate Athletic Union has had a short but troublous career. The circuit was partially disrupted early in the season by the defection of Western University, London, which was followed by the worst football weather experienced by the members of the circuit for years. Following upon this come charges from St. Jerome College that Woodstock College and the Ontario Agricultural College have been "playing chahoots" to bring about the defeat of St. Jerome.

Unless the W. I. A. U. allows the protest under which the Saturday game was played, St. Jerome threatens to quit the union. The protest is entered on the ground that there should have been an official from the O. A. C. and one from Woodstock, instead of two from this city.

St. Jerome has not even paid the union entrance fee, and is ipso facto ineligible to take part in any game in the union. Again, the protest which was entered on Saturday's game was not accompanied by the forfeit provided for in the constitution.

SHERIDAN SMASHES SHOT-PUT RECORD

Sends Weight 61 Ft. 8 Inches—Also Wins the 56-Pound Weight Event.

New York, Nov. 9.—The National Amateur Athletic Association held its annual indoor meet at Madison Square Garden before a large crowd of spectators today. Martin J. Sheridan made a new world's record for the shot, sending the weight 61 feet 8 inches. The results:

C. P. R. LOSSES SUIT

Claims Damages on Timber in Maine—Case Dismissed.

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 9.—The case of the C. P. R. versus the Ottawa Fire Insurance Co., was taken up in the supreme court. The railway company was insured against damage caused by locomotives to property located in the state of Maine (not including company's own property). Fire was caused by locomotives to standing timber in Maine, and the company, having indemnified the owners, made a claim for reimbursement under the policy.

The railway company refused to pay on the ground that standing timber was not included in the description of property which by its charter and the general insurance act of Ontario, it was authorized to insure. The railway company then brought an action claiming on the policy, and in the alternative for return of the premium with interest, if it was held that the policy was issued without authority.

The courts below held that the policy was valid as to the property that could, in law, be insured, but standing timber could not be included, and the action was dismissed.
