A party of 130 returned soldiers were taken yesterday afternoon in autos to Alisa Craig. The men were royally entertained and had the best kind of a time going, coming and all the time they were in Alisa Craig. The Alisa Craig ladies' committee, composed of Misses Ada and Sadie Munro, Kathleen and Alma Robinson, Charlotte and Lena Stevenson, Sandra Morton, Mary Craig, Florence Leitch and Anna Zevitz and the hostesses, Mesdames Leitch, Robinson, Fride, Stevenson, Crawford and Craig looked after every detail, and were heartily thanked for the thoroughness of their efforts, which the men appreciated.

When the party arrived refreshments were served, after which a baseball match was played off, and in the evening a fine musical program, in which Alisa Craig people and the returned soldiers took part, was put on in the town hall. Rev. Morgan, presided, and spoke of the pleasure it gave him to welcome on behalf of the people of Alisa Craig the soldiers on their visit. A cushion donated by Mrs. Morton was sold, the proceeds being drawn by a Penian Aid veteran, Mr. P. Atkinson. The cushion brought \$12, which will be used for patriotic purposes. A bag of potatoes, donated for patriotic purposes by Rev. Mr. Whalen sold for \$4. The Alisa Craig Women's Club is one of the most active organizations of its kind in the whole district and besides raising \$500 for the Byron Sanatorium for soldiers has raised over \$1,000 for Belgian relief and other purposes.

LIEUT. BELLINGER SERIOUSLY WOUNDED

The notification came to Pte. Bellinger at the home of his mother, Mrs. Ed. Taggart, 505 Ostrava avenue, near Major R. C. Campbell, 43rd Canadians.

Pte. Bellinger, who went overseas with the 18th, was seriously wounded at St. Eloi on April 10, 1915, and was invalided home some months ago. He has three brothers serving with the colors, a worthy record and one that indicates how the battles of Britain are being won.

Lieut. Bellinger has been in Canada on several occasions. He is now at 4th London General Hospital, Camberwell, London, England.

transferred to the
18th Battalion in France.

GARBAGE MEN GO ON STRIKE

Sore Over "Tipping" Charges,
But One Persuaded To
Return.

DENY THEY ARE GRAFTERS
Also Resent Stories That They
Were Acquainted With
Colored Woman.

The garbage collectors went out on
strike this morning, refusing to take
the city's refuse to the depot. The
engineer Brazier was called, and he
told the situation over with the
men, with the result that they resumed
their work. Definite instructions relative
to what constituted garbage and
what was not, were given, and an assurance
that their side of the "tipping" question
would be explained at a date to be
set later.

"The men are very sore at the re-
ports," said Mr. Brazier. "They insist
that much one-sided testimony has been
given, with the result that their case
has been prejudiced. However, they
were promised that their cases would
be looked into."

The men deny that they are grafters,
saying that they have not been tipped.
They are also much troubled about the
allegations relative to the dumping of
garbage in the back of a colored woman's
car who was supposed to be haunting
the collection.

Put Evidence on Record.
A proper investigation will be held.
At the meeting of the council on Mon-
day evening, a motion will be intro-
duced to have City Solicitor Meredith
investigate the matter, and the council
will properly meet the situation as far
as the city is concerned.

Estimates at the city hall yesterday
showed that the city had received \$200
to put the plant in a proper
working order. This is denied by Mr.
Engineer Brazier, who states that the
machinery can be fixed up for a few
hundred dollars.

Rules Being Drafted.
Mr. Brazier is drafting a set of
rules governing the men and the work
they are to do, and will present it to
the council in an early date.

I am going to make the rules so
tight that the people will know exactly
what the men are expected to do,"
said Mr. Brazier. "There is not going
to be any more of the kind of work
done in the future. Everything that
is in black and white. Regarding the
stories that the men received tips, and
that they were collecting garbage out-
side of the city limits, I contend that the
city is responsible for that. It is not
to blame the collector, and I think
that the city should be an example of it.
It is a serious matter, and we want
nothing but facts."

Less Under Mr. Boss.
In the discussion at the city hall to-
day, it developed that Contractor Boss
had not about \$200,000 in the city, and
that he was not to be paid for the work
done in the city.

These facts are being digested by the
aldermen, and some interesting infor-
mation will be produced later, it is re-
lated.

No steps have been taken as yet to re-
organize the staff. That will come later.

GINSBERG APPEAL WAS
ALLOWED WITH COSTS

It was stated by The Advertiser in
connection with the Ginsberg case that
the appeal from the order of Chief Jus-
tice Falconbridge had been dismissed
with costs. The appeal was allowed with
costs, and Ginsberg was ordered by the
court of appeal to attend at his own
expense before the Provincial Court, and
answer questions put to him by the as-
signed counsel.

The Consolidated Trusts Cor-
poration, respecting its assignment of the
benefit of creditors, whether such
assignment is to be made or not, has
been asked to answer these questions
because the answers, he alleged, might
be incriminating to him in a criminal
prosecution, and in his refusal to
answer, he was upheld by Chief Justice Fal-
conbridge. The court now under way
for making it yet more useful.

NEW GREAT WAR PICTURES BEING BROUGHT TO LONDON

London Will Be Taken to Front Line Trenches by "Fall of
Bapaume" Films at the Patricia All
Next Week.

What is described as a colossal pre-
sentation of the new war pictures is
being brought to this city by the Patricia
Theatre next week. This picture
brings the history of the war up to
the fall of Bapaume, capture of Per-
onne and the retreat of the German
hosts to the Hindenburg line. Dis-
patches are daily telling us of the
success of the Allies in their attacks
upon this line, which is nearly so
strong as the one that they over-
came by the early spring offensives.
The new official picture shows the
struggle shows the full detail of the
preparations and the continuous
struggle which brought the trench
after their set positions and fortified
trenches after nearly three years of
occupation. The picture is entitled
"The Fall of Bapaume," but it includes
more than that. It begins with the
arrival in France of fresh troops
from England, and gives a good sug-
gestion of the general situation of the
men who were sent to the front at
this time. It shows the offensive of the
spring, such as it was, and the final
training of the infantry and cavalry
was, practically speaking, war it-

The second part takes us right to the
front trenches. We have read the
story of the Canadian Corps, a most
of fighting since adopted by the
British. The picture shows the Ger-
mans themselves, who seek to re-
taliate for the worrying tactics which
they have adopted, and the contin-
uous stream of ammunition and supplies
which the soldiers receive. The picture
was emphasized by every visitor to
the front, and it is upon the per-
spective of the picture that the suc-
cess of the line's success largely depends. It

would be impossible to imagine an or-
ganization such as this war was de-
veloped on the western front were it
not for the moving pictures such as this.
It shows as never before the actual
how the immense scale upon which
this organization has been built up
since the battle of the Somme, com-
menced, back last July.

Pictures of front line fighting
have been shown before. Some of them
the true and official, others were un-
official and some others were fakes.
This is the official record of the Brit-
ish and comprehensive. It shows every
unit of service in the war—artillery,
infantry, medical service, transport,
army medical service, engineers, trans-
port, soldiers' life off as well as on.

In addition to the film is devoted
to the first moving picture of the
British navy that have been permitted
publication to show the famous battleships
of Admiral Beatty's squadron in their
battle order. A view of the grand
fleet of the British navy, which has
been taken from a naval hydroplane
6,000 feet in the air.

As to the air, the fighting in the
film there is plenty. The charge upon
the German trenches previous to the
capture of Bapaume is shown in great
detail. There is shown trench raid-
ing, bombing, scouting, aerial fighting,
savage hand-to-hand fighting, and the
heroism of the British.

Arrangements have been made to
show the fall of Bapaume in a special
show at the Patricia. As in the case of all official
British pictures of the war, the fall
of Bapaume being presented by
Messrs. Jule and Jay J. Allen.
