Y., July 30. - Two wrecking crews are at work this morning clearing the debris of the wreck of New York Central's Pacific express, which ran into a landslide one mile south of New Hamburg at 11:30 last night, resulting in the death of Edward Wells, the engineer of Albany, and Edward Warren, fireman, of New York, and in injuries to about a dozen passengers, none of which will prove fatal.
