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SEEKING NEW TRIAL FOR MURDERER FOR LEGAL TECHNICALITY

Friends of Winnipeg Officer's Slayer Start Move.

WINDSOR, March 16.—Acting on instructions from Detroit friends of John Hogue, alias James Stewart, sentenced to death last week at Sandwich for the murder of W. Marshall Jackson, Canadian immigration officer, of Winnipeg, Barrister F. C. Kerby of Windsor is taking steps preparatory to asking the appellate court at Toronto for a reserved case.

The application is based on the fact that Mr. Justice Sutherland failed to explain sub-section B and C of the Criminal Code, which defines culpable homicide, when the jury asked for instructions. The court, Barrister Kerby states, read the sub-section, and offered no interpretation.

The sub-section under which the jury found Hogue guilty reads as follows: "If the offender means to cause to the person killed any bodily injury which is known to the offender to be likely to cause death, and is reckless whether death ensues or not."

CHATHAM BREAKING ALL CUSTOMS RECORDS

CHATHAM, March 16.—All records for the port of Chatham have been shattered by the overwhelming increase in customs returns, which, by the end of the month, the close of the fiscal year, will have reached over \$1,000,000. Already the collections amount to \$398,575.87, as compared with \$527,074.94 collected last year. For the first half of this month the collections were \$60,431.07, an increase of \$27,729.54 over the same month last year.

DEAD MAN'S SON OR LATTER'S GIRL ARE ACCUSED BY JURY

William St. Pierre Murdered by Either One.

SHOT THROUGH KNOTHOLE

Statement Accredited to Girl in Jail Sheds New Light.

AULTSVILLE, March 16.—Before a crowd of 500 men and women who had struggled fiercely to get into Fraternity Hall, the inquest into the death of William St. Pierre on February 7 was resumed here today by Coroner McGuire. Nettie Richmire, who lived with Emerson St. Pierre, son of deceased, and who is detained with him in connection with the case; the widow St. Pierre and baby and the murdered man's two little girls sat apart. The girls are beautiful and bright. The Richmire girl, who looked despondent on the trip up on the train from Cornwall, and who shrank back as she was taken through the crowd to the hall, brightened up at the sight of the baby and played laughingly with it. Never heard of God.

Florence St. Pierre, aged nine, was asked if she had ever been to church and said "no." She said she had never heard of God, but knew it was wrong to tell a lie. The oath was not administered. The child testified that on February 7 she left for school. Her father, sister, Emerson and Nettie were at home. When she came home Nettie told her that her father had gone to the village. They all went to her grandfather's for the night. She never saw her father again.

Lella St. Pierre, the second child, said Emerson took her mother to Chertsville on February 6. She corroborated her sister's story about those in the house on the day of the murder.

Nettie Richmire declined to give evidence and she was excused.

Officer's Testimony.
Inspector Miller said he examined Emerson St. Pierre. The young man said his father went away, leaving money to buy hay for the horse. He knew nothing more about his movements. The day after this conversation he was searching the house and found partly stuffed up the chimney an overcoat and a pair of trousers.

When Nettie Richmire said to him when Mr. Stiles (her counsel) objected. Detective Miller said the girl at that time was not a prisoner. The coroner allowed the detective to proceed.

The detective said Nettie at first told the same story about St. Pierre's departure as the son. After he found the clothing Nettie rushed up and said: "I have been telling you a lie; I shot him!" He then took the girl to the house of a neighbor and warned her about saying anything.

Said She Killed Him.
The girl made a statement and signed the copy he made of it. In this statement the girl said she was not married to Emerson. The old St. Pierre had assaulted her on two occasions. Once he threatened to kill her if she resisted him. She shot him with a revolver, dragged the body to a trap-door and flung it into the cellar. She found \$30 in his clothes. She forged the note, saying St. Pierre had gone away. In a second confession she said she was the big boy and visitors the girl acknowledged using the shot gun after the revolver to kill St. Pierre.

Detective Miller then produced a further statement made at the county jail at Cornwall. Mr. Stiles again objected and it was not read.

A revolver, shotgun and a number of cartridges were put in as evidence. The jury brought in a verdict that William St. Pierre came to his death by a gunshot wound fired from the hands of either Nettie Richmire or Emerson St. Pierre. The most interesting contention in the statement made by Nettie Richmire in the Cornwall County jail is that St. Pierre was shot through a knothole in the ceiling from another room and that he fell dead across the table in front of her.

JEW'S WILL BE FREE TO CITIZENSHIP NOW UNDER DUMA'S RULE

Far-Reaching Reforms Promised by Authorities.

SUFFRAGE IS UNIVERSAL

Removal of Social, Religious and National Restrictions for All.

LONDON, March 16.—Far-reaching reforms in Russia are promised the people as a result of the revolution in the country and the overthrow of the bureaucrats. A constitutional assembly based on universal suffrage, abolition of all social, religious and national restrictions, and amnesty for all political and religious offences are included in the program of the executive committee of the Duma, which constitutes the provisional government.

The removal of social, religious and national restrictions would give freedom to the Jews in Russia. Liberty of speech and of the press, and universal suffrage in communal elections also are contemplated. The political and religious offences are included in the program of the executive committee of the Duma, which constitutes the provisional government.

Obnoxious Forces Beaten.
"Citizens: The executive committee of the Duma with the aid and support of the kharid of the capital and its inhabitants, has succeeded in triumphing over the obnoxious forces of the old regime in such a manner that we are able to proceed to a more stable organization of the executive power, with men whose political and social assurances them the country's confidence."

The names of the members of the new government are then given, the appeal concludes. "The new cabinet will base its policy on the following principles: First—An immediate general amnesty for all political and religious offences, including terrorist acts and military and agrarian offences.

Liberty of Speech.
"Second—Liberty of speech and of the press; freedom for alliances, unions and strikes, with the extension of these liberties to military officials within the limits admitted by military requirements."

"Third—Abolition of all social, religious and national restrictions.

"Fourth—To proceed forthwith to the preparation and adoption of a constitutional assembly, based on universal suffrage, which will establish a governmental regime.

"Fifth—The substitution of the police by a national militia, with chiefs to be elected and responsible to the government."

Universal Suffrage.
"Sixth—Communal elections to be based on universal suffrage.

"Seventh—The troops which participated in the revolutionary movement will not be disarmed, but will remain in Petrograd."

"Eighth—While maintaining strict military discipline for troops on active service, it is desirable to arbitrate for soldiers all restrictions in the enjoyment of social rights accorded other citizens."

The provisional government desires to add that it has no intention to profit by the circumstances of the war to delay the realization of the measures of reform above mentioned."

ST. LOUIS, March 16.—St. Louis is going to spend \$30,000 in entertaining visitors during the forthcoming advertising convention. The National Association of Employing Lithographers will be represented at the St. Louis convention by a delegation of at least 250. The association will have at least twelve more exhibitors at the St. Louis convention than were at Philadelphia. The Nashville club will bring the Russian Symphony Orchestra to that city early in April and expects to make enough money to cover the expenses of advertising Nashville at the St. Louis convention. The delegates will pay their own expenses. Kansas City is making elaborate plans to entertain visiting delegations from the west en route to the St. Louis convention. June 2 is to be the big day and visitors will be met at trains in automobiles and shown over the city. A complimentary luncheon will be a feature. Indianapolis is planning to take 250 to the convention, including delegations from smaller cities. An On-to-St. Louis committee is planning the details of the trip.

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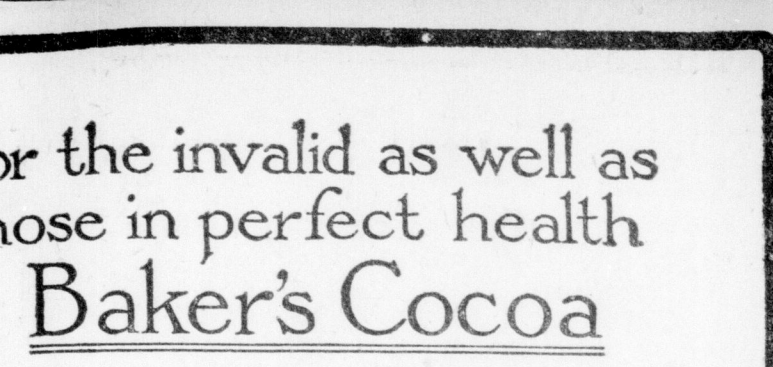
