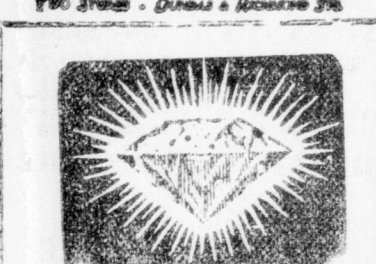

HOW THAMESVILLE GIRLS HELP TO 'KEEP THE HOME FIELDS EARNING' BRISKLY

Plant and Till Small Plot, Making Good Profit on Season.

How women can aid the Empire by assisting in the cultivation of the soil, as suggested in an advertiser editorial, has been ably demonstrated by a company of Girl Guides at Thamesville, commanded by Miss Catherine MacVicar Duncan.

A plot of land 32 feet by 32 feet, on which extra early Burka potatoes were grown, yielded a profit of \$3.25, not counting the cost of labor, and produced eight and a half bushels of potatoes. The value of the crop was \$11.35. Ninety pounds of seed were used, this being contributed by the agricultural department.

The land was plowed and manured in 1915, and in the spring was harrowed twice. The potatoes were planted on May 8 in 12 rows running the width of the plot. Each row was looked after by one of the Girl Guides. The weather was exceptionally wet and remained so for several weeks. Sprays were used in the summer, and the land was hoed three times a week. The land was cultivated once with a horse cultivator at a cost of \$2.10.

On another plot of the same size, late Davies Warrior potatoes were grown. This plot yielded only 4½ bushels, with a profit of \$2.65. The seed used (50 pounds) was of poor quality. The weather was very dry and the growth slow. The plants blossomed poorly. Steady work throughout the summer, however, prevented the young gardeners from losing money. The total value of the crop was \$4.15.

In addition to this, mixed vegetables were grown on one side of the plot to the value of \$3.50. Asparagus were grown on the other side of the plot, and were sold by the Girl Guides on an "After Day." The sum of \$13.25 was realized from these, and turned over to the tobacco fund at Thamesville.

The company consists of four patrol leaders, and is commanded by Miss Catherine Duncan, who contributed the land for the farming experiment. Thirty-two girls are enrolled and pledged to obey the motto, "Keep the home fields earning."

QUEBEC BUSINESSMEN TO MISS LONDON ON TOUR
Are Visiting Toronto, Hamilton and Niagara Falls Next Week.

London is not to be honored by a visit from the party of Quebec businessmen returning the call of the Ontario men who went to the eastern city last fall in an endeavor to win a sale to have met with considerable success, to draw closer the relationship between the people of the two provinces.

The route of the Quebec party has been arranged, and this city is not included. On Monday the party arrives in Toronto, where, in the evening, it will be entertained at a banquet. On Tuesday, Hamilton is to be visited, and on Wednesday the easterners will be the guests of the power companies at Niagara Falls. They will then return home.

J. K. Pope was the only Londoner who accompanied the Ontario men in their eastern tour, and on his return he expressed hopes that this would be one of the cities to be visited on a visit. So far as he knows no further attempt was made to bring the Quebec men here, and so London was ignored.

Gordon Philip, secretary of the board of trade, informed The Advertiser that this organization had made no effort to have London chosen as one of the points of call.

FORMER LONDON RECTOR MENTIONED IN DISPATCHES
Rev. C. C. Owen Distinguished for His Gallantry at the Front.

MAYOR TO BE GOVERNOR, AND ALSO J. C. DUFFIELD
Difficulty on University Board Cleared Up by Change in Bylaws.

The difficulty in the way of appointing governors for the Western University has been cleared up, and a satisfactory arrangement reached. The errors have been made provision in their by-laws for the appointment, ex-officio, of the mayor as a governor. Mayor Stevenson will be notified that he is a member of the board, and will take his seat. In future, the mayor will have a vote in the conduct of the Western.

This clears the way for the council to appoint James C. Duffield, who is considered to have done excellent work in connection with the university. He has given liberally of his time and money, and is a most valued member. The council on Monday will make his appointment.

OVER 500 RETURNED MEN IN THIS DISTRICT NOW

Number Likely To Be Doubled in Next Three Months.

A meeting of the executive committee was held on Friday afternoon at the city hall, at which plans were discussed for coping with the increasing work of the Soldiers' Aid Commission.

In addition to the executive, a number of businessmen were present, and E. C. Norris, inspector of branches of the Soldiers' Aid Commission, also attended.

Plans for financing the work were discussed. Mr. Norris asked the local executive to offer suggestions to the headquarters of the commission in Toronto, in order that some comprehensive plan of centralizing the work of the whole of No. 1 Military District could be arranged. The co-operation of the other branches in the district with the London office is desired.

A deputation will be appointed to confer with the headquarters of the commission in Toronto on these matters.

Mr. Norris gave those present an outline of the information needed in Toronto. He is endeavoring to find out means of preparing for the expected increase in work, due to more returned men arriving here. There are approximately 500 in this district now, and this number is expected to be doubled in the next three months.

As Result One James F. Smith Is Remanded on Fraud Charge.

James F. Smith, giving his address as the Richmond House, and claiming to be an employee of the Grand Trunk, appeared in police court today charged with fraud.

The information was laid by Chris Cross, who alleges that Smith "double crossed" him by borrowing \$7 on a watch claimed to be worth only a fraction of the loan.

Cross claims that Smith represented that he was a Grand Trunk employee and was in need of funds, and would be willing to give him \$46, twenty-one-jeweled railroad watch as security for a \$7 loan. Cross claims the tell for the deal and discovered he had been trimmed shortly after.

Crown Attorney McKillop asked that the accused be remanded to jail for one week, and Magistrate Macklin and Dyer accordingly made out the order to that effect.

SOLDIERS' AID WORK IS GROWING RAPIDLY

More Equipment Needed in London, Says Inspector.

C. E. Norris, inspector of branches of the Soldiers' Aid Commission of Ontario, was in the city Friday, inspecting the work and equipment of the London branch. To The Advertiser he stated that he had found the work of the local branch highly satisfactory, but the equipment is inadequate for the amount of work that has to be done.

"An increasingly large number of men are returning to this district, and more equipment is needed to look after them," he said. "When this is supplied more personal attention can be given to the men who require information or assistance."

Speaking of the work of the commission throughout Ontario, he stated that there are now 46 branches, mostly in the large towns, and it is hoped to extend the branches into the smaller places. "The work of the commission is entirely new work, and Ontario is leading in this direction. More men are returning to Ontario because of the large number enlisted in the province. Because the work is new, it is not yet perfect."

"We have had deputations from all the other provinces to obtain our plan of organization. Ontario went to the expense of finding these things out for herself, and now the others are benefiting from our information."

"My work is to help in the formation of new branches and to assist those already formed."

"In all about 2,000 returned men have found employment through the commission, and these results show the efficiency of the work."

"The returned soldier first is the general feeling that I have found in my work throughout Ontario. All government departments and the majority of manufacturers wish to give returned men the first opportunity when filling positions that are vacant."

"The London branch is well organized," he added, "and as done very valuable work. In addition it has supplied the head office in Toronto with valuable information."

Mr. Norris expects to complete his work in this city today.
