\$8,000 BUILDING FOR NEW CHURCH IN KNOLLWOOD PARK

Presbyterian Council Decides
To Build It.

CANVASS IS STARTING

\$3,000 Will Be Secured From
Other Church Members
in London.

A new church costing \$8,000 will be
built in Knollwood Park. This was
decided at a meeting of the Presby-
terian Council last evening.

"If we can raise \$2,000 for the pur-
pose of entertaining 500 delegates to the
general assembly, and then fall down
on the same amount for the aid of the
real work, our Christianity is not
properly balanced," said J. H. Laugh-
ton, in reference to the proposed build-
ing.

It was finally decided to canvass the
Presbyterians of the city for the sum
of \$2,000 for the building fund, and to
go ahead with the work as soon as the
arrangements can be completed. Com-
mittees were appointed to superintend
the canvass. David Ross, Rev. D. C.
MacGregor, A. S. MacGregor and John
S. Moore were chosen to wait on Geo.
M. Reid to ask him to act as convener
of the canvassing committee.

The following were appointed to this
committee: David Ross, Lieut.-Col. W.
M. Gartshore, W. C. Allen, John Mac-
pherson and John S. Moore. The com-
mittee will report back to the council
in two weeks.

There was considerable discussion
preceding the concrete action of the
meeting. That there is a great need
for a new church edifice in Knollwood
Park no one denied. The amount of
the 1,300 which were called for rather
staggered some of the members. The
first estimate of the building cost was
\$10,180. When these figures were
presented to the building committee
some time ago that body decided there
was no use in calling the council to-
gether, after some consideration some
specifications were cut out and the
price brought down to \$7,912.

This was presented to the council
by Rev. James Mackay, convener of
the building committee. The question
as to whether the customary 31-1-3 per
cent would be added to the tender be-
fore the building was completed was
raised by Rev. D. C. MacGregor. He
was assured that the amount of the
tender covered everything, even the
hardware. The seating, of course, will
be extra, it was pointed out the present
building at Knollwood Park was also
discussed. Estimates had been pre-
pared, and it was found that the cost
would be \$1,000. This is more than
the building is worth, it was thought.
This proposition was readily discarded.

There was some uncertainty as to
why the balance left from the enter-
tainment fund of the general assembly
had not been turned over to the build-
ing fund, as had been passed by a
former meeting of the council. Rev.
J. C. MacGregor explained that as
some of the sessions had not raised
their allotted amount it was decided
by the finance committee that the bal-
ance should be returned to each church
in proportion to its allotted amount.
This explanation was accepted. The
opinion was expressed, however, that
the committee should have referred the
question to the council before taking
this action.

It was expected that the contracts
would have been let, but the council
decided to secure the amount of money
necessary first. The canvass will be
completed as early as possible. The
work will be pushed in work that the
building may be ready for use by fall.
J. H. Laughton presided over the
meeting and R. D. Miller was present
as secretary of the Presbyterian
Council.

**QUERIES REGARDING
MILITARY SERVICE**

Send in Your Problems and They
Will Be Answered From Official
Information by The Advertiser.

A. M. H. Q.—I was married in
January, 1918. My husband was
drafted May 14. Will I get \$25 sep-
aration allowance every month, and
do we receive our pay every two
weeks?

2. To whom should I apply to get
half his wages and the separation al-
lowance?
A.—I. You are entitled to it. You will
get the separation allowance every
month, and the assigned pay every
month also.
2. He must assign you \$15, and may
assign you to \$20. Apply to the district
paymaster, if after reasonable delay ap-
plication he signs up, no pay arrives.

L. I. T. Q.—I am in B2 and farm-
ing. The local tribunal has refused
me exemption, subject to re-exam-
ination. My employer has appealed.
If the traveling medical board should
sit far from here, can I be com-
pelled to be re-examined, before my
appeal is over, and if exempted for
several months, will I be re-exam-
ined before my exemption expires?
A.—It is not clear just what is meant
by "subject to re-examination." Any
exempted man is liable to be re-exam-
ined at any time the registrar may de-
cide. It is unlikely that you will be
examined until your appeal is decided,
unless you have been ordered to go di-
rectly before a medical board before
the decision is rendered.

BOTHWELL. Q.—I am 22, was
placed in E list fall, re-examined in
May and placed in A2, and told to
wait till called. Can I go to the city
for a day or two by carrying an ex-
emption certificate without being de-
tained by the military police?
A.—Yes, if you have your exemption
certificate, you may go where you like,
until called.

WARDSVILLE. Q.—Do the boys
in the 19-year-old class have to
register under national registration
law, the same as other people?
A.—Yes, unless they are on active
service in the army or navy.

**SAYS CITY WILL
BENEFIT GREATLY
BY ROAD SCHEME**

Ontario Minister of Public
Works Expresses Surprise
at London's Attitude.

MAKE WHOLE CITY PAY

No Need of Paving Streets On
Frontage Basis, Declares
Hon. Finlay Macdormid.

"London is the only city in the prov-
ince of Ontario which has raised objec-
tion to the suburban road scheme, and
it will be one of the cities most ben-
efited," declared Hon. Finlay Macdormid,
Ontario's minister of public works, who
was in the city Monday.

The minister pointed to the fact that
London is surrounded by a rich farming
area, and may be entered from all
sides. He believed that the suburban
roads would bring many people into the
city to trade here.

It was pointed out that a strong ob-
jection to the scheme was that to pave
the streets in the city, which lead to
the country, would practically legislate
the people on these streets out of their
homes. Mr. Macdormid said that this
was a problem easy to get over. The
charge could be placed on the city at
large. He did not consider such a road
a local improvement like a sidewalk in
front of a man's house. Such a road
would be to the benefit of all, and should
be paid for by the whole city. Mr.
Macdormid declared the belief that
London would readily adopt the scheme
when it came to better understand it.

The minister had a few words to say
for his fish business. He said that
since the department opened the whole-
sale house in Toronto it has sold 400-
000 pounds of fish. The demand had in-
creased wonderfully and the use of fish
also. He pointed to Simcoe as an ex-
ample. It had ordered 200 pounds a
week, and then gradually increased un-
til it reached 1,500 pounds weekly.

The northern lakes have turned out
wonderfully, said the minister, and al-
ready steps are being taken to restock
them. He expressed the belief that
Lake Nipissing was a real find.

**EMPLOYMENT BUREAU
STILL REPORTS GIRLS
READY FOR SERVICE**

Farmers and Fruit Growers
Need But to Apply
for Help.

The following letter received from
the director of the woman's farm de-
partment of the Ontario Government
employment bureau at Toronto points
out the fact that there are still women
and girls in this province anxious to
help in the great scheme for greater
production throughout the country. A
year's trial has proved that women are
not only capable of farm labor of many
kinds, but are so adapted as to become
experts at this form of work. Farmers
in Ontario need no go without labor as
long as women are willing to help. The
letter follows:

"The women's farm department re-
ports still more girls being placed on
mixed and dairy farms in districts
where one or more were placed in the
early spring. One farmer writes:
"Yesterday Mr. — called to see
how he could procure them from now
until after harvest."
He adds: "Do you think it possible for
a number of girls to be fitted out in a
thrilling outfit in the same way that men do
in the West, and thrash by the bush?
The girls who are here now are coming
machinery, and almost everything the
ordinary man can do."

This letter came from a district that
two months ago was afraid to try girls
on farms at all.

Two months has seen a great change
in the attitude of the farmers in many
districts of Ontario to the farmerettes.
The women's farm department now has
difficulty in finding enough experienced
girls to fill the orders that come in.

"A number of women experienced in
outdoor work are still available during
July and August only. A few women
have applied for work in butter fac-
tories, but as yet the girls have come
in for that kind of worker."

Several girls are now doing suc-
cessful work on a cheese box factory,
while one drives a truck and delivers
the boxes. A number of girls are now
handling milk routes satisfactorily.

"Fruit growers, truck farmers, mixed
and dairy farms, cheese factories, gar-
agers, may still apply to Miss Martin,
director of women's farm department,
45 King Street West, Toronto, and
secure competent help."

Miss McRoberts is the district rep-
resentative in London, and application
may be made through her also.

keep in touch with the comrades and
the widows, and the children of for-
mer members of "London's Own" (the
142nd Battalion). The club will also
assist in finding suitable employment
for all discharged comrades. Special
gatherings will be arranged for the
widows, and the children of former
members of "London's Own" will be
met by members of the club. It was
decided that the club be known as
"London's Own Comrades Club."

The following members of the com-
mittee were present: Comrades W. J.
Widdicombe, A. Capon, W. C. Dorey,
Bundmaster, Widdicombe, W. J. Myers.
The meeting place of the club was
not definitely decided, but will be ar-
ranged for later.

FOOD LAW QUERIES

The following query has been received
regarding the necessity of a license
to serve meals for holiday dinners.
A lady has five in family and two
boarders, and intends taking from four
to five meals for holiday dinners. Would
she require a license, if so, what is the
charge, and where can it be obtained?

Referring the query to James Gray,
local representative of the publicly de-
partment of the Canada Food Board,
he reports that a license is required
where the number of meals served daily
exceeds the family of fifteen or
more. This can be obtained from the
license department of the Canada Food
Board at Ottawa, and will cost \$2. "If
we do not take more than eight for
dinner with the two boarders, you will
not need a license, as you would be
serving only fourteen meals outside
your own family. You must, however,
observe the regulations in regard to
the serving of meats, etc." Mr. Gray
says.
