### CANADA IS NOT **SO GENEROUS TO MEN AS BRITAIN**

Returned Men Feel Hurt at the Great Discrepancy in Allowances.

SYSTEM IN MOTHERLAND

Pleases the Dominion Fighters Much Better Than the One Here.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, Dec. 4.—The discrepancy between the allowance granted to mem-Force at the expiry of their terms of service and those granted to officers and men of the British army is a subject of comment by returning men. Canada provides for an allowance of three months' pay after discharge. The officer man who has been at the front since commencement gets just the same no more than the man who joined and no more than the man who joined up just before the armistice ceased.

In England service in France is recognized. The man who has seen one year's service in France receives 124 days' pay after discharge with 62 days' extra pay for every year or portion thereafter. In Canada no distinction is made between the man who has been in France and the man who has not.

Canadian returned men object not only Canadian returned men object not only to this fact, but to the fact that the three months' allowance after discharge will scarcely serve to put them into civilian clothes at present high costs.
