NEW ORGANIZATION OF SCOTCH WOMEN IS FORMED IN CITY

Hope to Extend Daughters of Scotland Movement in Ontario.

The Scotch women of the city have formed an organization of their own in connection with the well-known local institution, The Sons of Scotland. This organization, whose existence in the city is largely due to the energies of Mrs. Robert Tagg, is known as Edinburgh Castle Camp, Daughters of Scotland, and held its initial meeting on March 15. It will not be until after the installation of officers on April 5, however, that the new organization will be in proper working condition. Already interesting events have been planned, the Daughters of Scotland having arranged to entertain the soldiers at the Military "Y" on Friday next, and the Scotch lassies lately arrived from the old country at the Ontario Hospital at a later date.

The camp is for social and benevolent purposes, and has attached to its membership insurance and sick benefits. Any woman of Scotch descent is eligible for membership in this society. London with its 50 members is the second camp organized in Ontario, one having been organized in Windsor previously. It is expected, however, that shortly there will be Daughters of Scotland camps in almost every town and city in the province.

Large Number Over Class Limit Applies for Membership.

The first class begins tonight at 7:15 to 8:15, an advanced class. The class for beginners is from 8:15 to 9:15, and all who come to these classes must bring with them a medical certificate.

BEILINDA.
