

The resolution of the Toronto Trades and Labor Council recommending that the workers of Canada align themselves with the workers' political parties of other countries, and that they base their platform on advocacy of an industrial system of production for use instead of for profit, and that the congress grant \$5,000 to the provincial labor party to be spent for educational purposes to attain this, was sponsored by James Simpson, who explained that what was really sought was a nationalization of industries the same as had been successfully tried in Queensland, Australia and New Zealand.

P. M. Draper, the secretary, however, thought that what was really the object of the resolution was \$5,000 from the congress treasury and supported the recommendation of the committee that the resolution be not concurred in, and the convention voted noncorrence.

Other features of the day were election of officers, resulting in the reelection of President Tom Moore, and Secretary-treasurer P. M. Draper by acclamation, the selection of Winnipeg as the next place of meeting, the adoption of the report of the committee on resolutions, condemning any attempt to enforce the anti-loading law and an address by J. E. Davidson. The British fraternal delegate, in his address, predicted a general election in Great Britain within a month and reiterated his declaration of yesterday that the workers of Britain would demand the entire fruits of their labor.

In addition to the discussion on the Irish question and nationalization of industries during the afternoon session the congress passed salary increases to the president of \$1,500, making his salary \$2,000 per annum. Six hundred dollars was voted to the fraternal delegate to the American Federation of Labor, and \$1,500 to the delegate to the British Trades Union Congress.

The consideration of the report of the committee on resolutions was continued on the convention resuming business for its first night session at 8 o'clock.

This was followed by the report of the committee on ways and means, which first recommended that the salary of the president be raised from \$3,500 to \$4,500, and Delegate Burton of Hamilton meved in amendment that it be made \$4,000, which was seconded by Mr. Moore himself.

Secretary-Treasurer Draper then spoke for the adoption of the committee's report, and Henry Barrett of London moved that the increase, instead of being \$1,000, be made \$1,500, and this was carried unanimously, as was the increase of \$500 to Secretary-Treasurer Draper, making his honorarium \$2,000 per annum. A grant of \$600 was made to the fraternal delegate to the American Federation of Labor convention to be held at Denver, and \$1,500 to the fraternal delegate to the British Trades Union Congress, although the committee's recommendation was only for \$1,000.

Heard in an Uproar.

Need a Padded Cell.
