the son of the late Donald Archibald MacDonell. He was educated in the common schools of Glengarry, and at St. Joseph's College, Ottawa, and took his theological course at the Grand Seminary, Montreal. He was ordained in September, 1881, by the late Archibishop Cleary of Kingston, being the first Canadian priest ordained by that dignitary, and was stationed at Gananoque for about four years. In 1886, he succeeded Archbishop Gauthier in the pastorate of Glen Nevis. He later was priest at St. Andrew's west. He was appointed bishop in 1906.

The funeral will take place in Alexandria on Saturday next.
