### FUTURE OF THE EMPIRE DEPENDS ON THE BOYS

Gen. French's Stirring Reminder to Toronto's School Boy Cadets—Inspiring Scene in the Park.

"You are at that time of life when lessons are easily learned and when character is formed. Recently you have had the opportunity of seeing wonderful scenes of grief and mourning. These have been worldwide and have been witnessed on every continent of the globe. Remember, boys, that we belong to a great empire, which has a mighty influence, and remember that the future of that empire depends on you. The destinies of that empire will be yours to shape, after we are all dead and gone. Maintain the greatness of that empire and continue its mighty influence for good."

In these words General Sir John French addressed the public and high school cadets yesterday morning on the university campus, just as rain began to fall.

Thirty-two hundred strong, the cadets, in scarlet tunics, left the armories and marched to the parliament buildings, accompanied by bands of flower girls, bearing floral tributes from the different schools with which they decorated the monuments in Queen's Park.

In front of the buildings were Gen. French, several of the cabinet ministers, members of the board of education, General Lake, Gen. Cotton, Col. Galloway, Col. Howard, Col. Sam. Hughes, Col. Sir Henry Pellett, Col. Lessard, Col. Williams, Col. Denison, Col. Delamere and Col. Merritt.

After the march past, the various battalions were presented with colors by several members of the parliament of the Empire, who were introduced to Gen. French by Mrs. Nordheimer, supreme regent of the Canadian Order.

The scene in the march past was most spectacular, special applause being earned by the cadet bugle band, formed during the past year. The Victoria Industrial School boys were also there.

Earl Grey, who, owing to King Edward's death, cancelled all his engagements, and so was not present yesterday, sent a letter to Inspector Hughes, saying:

"It is a great personal disappointment to me that I cannot enjoy the sight of the march past. I had been looking forward to it during the past year to the march past on next Empire Day. I can honestly say that every Empire Day which I have spent in Toronto has been one of the happiest days of my year, for the way in which it has been celebrated has enabled me to realize, and with the greatest satisfaction, the steady growth in the recognition in Toronto of the importance of this imperial festival."

"I trust the Empire Day celebrations may prove every year a more and more potent influence in stimulating the growth of a spirit of duty and patriotism, not only among the rising, but also among the risen generation, including all to subordinate."
