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# WOMEN OF EMPIRE GUESTS AT DINNER

Delightful Evening Provided  
by Board of Trade —  
Graceful Speeches.

Wives of the members of the Con-  
gress of Chamber of Commerce of the  
Empire were guests of the Toronto  
Board of Trade, the ladies' committee  
acting as hostesses, at the club  
premises last night, when the spa-  
cious dining hall looked very inviting  
in its handsome table appointments  
and floral decorations. The guests  
representing different parts of the  
empire were distributed amongst the  
many small tables, each with a local  
hostess, the idea proving most con-  
ducive to breezy interchange of ideas.  
Representing the city, Miss Church,  
sister of the mayor, presided at the  
head table, and at the close of the  
menu, proposed the health of the  
King, which was honored by the sing-  
ing of the National Anthem.

In a brief and happy address, Miss  
Church welcomed the visitors, stating  
that there was no city that had a  
greater affection for tea mother land  
than Toronto. The speaker drew the  
attention of those present to a large  
canvass on the wall, showing Toronto  
in 1854, now a city of half a million  
population. The work of the women  
overseas was paid tribute to by the  
speaker who also referred to the men  
of the empire as represented by un-  
derestimated representatives, who  
from time to time had visited this  
city. The war, said Miss Church, had  
brought out a better feeling thru  
showing that the thing worth while  
was the strength of manhood, of  
womanhood, and of children in ser-  
vice for humanity.

In reply, Mrs. Stanley Meecham  
spoke briefly, but eloquently, stating  
that the welcome everywhere given  
the delegates had been overwhelming.  
She had never enjoyed herself so  
much in her life, as during the short  
time she had been in Canada. They  
had also seen much of interest, and  
she thanked Miss Church and all who  
had contributed to make their stay  
so delightful.

Mrs. Hardie briefly seconded the  
appreciation of the guests, a charming  
musical program was given by  
Kathleen Reid, violinist; Mrs. Mc-  
Kenzie Thompson, soprano, and Mrs.  
MacMillan, pianist.
