
PEARY, UNDAUNTED, WILL MAKE ANOTHER ATTEMPT TO REACH THE NORTH POLE

CUT DOWN THE NUMBER OF LIQUOR LICENSES

City of Halifax Decides to Have Fewer Licenses Higher Fees and More Severe Penalties for Violation of the Law.

Halifax Chronicle, April 9.

Fewer liquor licenses, higher fees and very severe penalties are the chief provisions of an ordinance introduced by Hon. David McPherson, in the house of assembly yesterday afternoon.

It provides that hereafter until the census to be taken in the year 1907 has been taken, and the population of the city of Halifax has been made known, the number of hotel licenses, and shop licenses for the sale of intoxicating liquors issued in the city of Halifax shall not combined in any one year exceed 90, and after the population has been made known, shall not in any year exceed a number equal to one for every 500 of such population.

The following license duties shall be payable and shall be in lieu of all other provincial or municipal duties and fees:— For each hotel having under 25 rooms, \$300

For each hotel having 25 rooms, but not exceeding 50 rooms, \$400

For each hotel having 50 rooms, but not exceeding 75 rooms, \$500

For each shop license, \$250

For each wholesale license, \$600

No person shall be the agent for or on behalf of any firm, or company

NEW PROPOSITION FROM F. E. WILLIAMS
