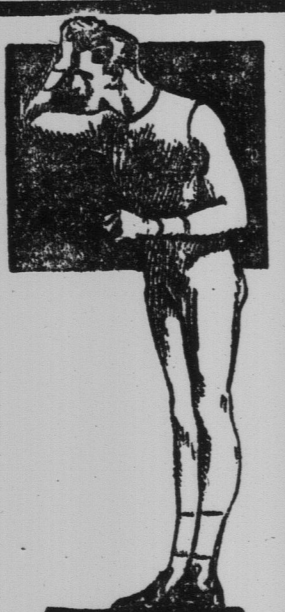

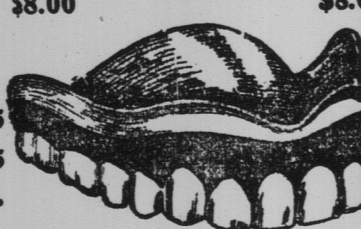

A BRAVE DEED THAT WON CROIX DE GUERRE FOR AN AMERICAN

The following story of how Private John McClain, aged twenty-four, won the Croix de Guerre is told by the Paris "Herald". On the night of September 18 a German bombing aeroplane flew over the village in which he was. McClain dropped several bombs, and one fell within fifteen feet of a building around which some fifty villagers had gathered.

Despite the warning and expostulations of those around him, Private McClain dashed out into the road with his pocket searchlight, snatched up the bomb, which had not yet exploded, and hurled it into the river near by. The projectile exploded just as it struck the water, sending up a large waterpout, but the intrepid American boy threw himself flat and escaped injury.

AGAINST APPOINTMENT OF CANADIAN REPRESENTATIVE AT AMERICAN CAPITAL

(Montreal Journal of Commerce) Reports from Ottawa, which we are glad to know are not official, state that it is the intention of the government to provide for the appointment of a Canadian commissioner at Washington at a very large salary; \$25,000 is mentioned. There is a disposition at Ottawa—which appears to be watching by the advocates of economy—to multiply offices. The cabinet, already very large, is being increased by additional portfolios. This Washington idea is along the same line. Unless there are new and undisclosed reasons for it, the appointment of a commissioner at Washington is one of the things that can well be laid aside.

A Canadian commissioner at Washington would necessarily be a subordinate of the British ambassador. Where the ambassador is as amiable as Lord Bryce or Sir Cecil Spring Rice perhaps no friction would arise. But it is not safe to assume that British and Canadian interests will always be served at the American capital by such placid officials as the late and present ambassadors of Great Britain. The national status that Canada has gained in late years will go far to ensure respectful consideration from all imperial officials. Nevertheless, the relations that would be created by the appointment of a Canadian commissioner would be a standing temptation to dispute with the ambassador or his English staff.

Home from the West

Dr. W. S. Carter, chief superintendent of education, has returned to Fredericton after a six weeks' tour of the west during which time he studied educational systems in vogue in Canada, especially in the new provinces. He is much impressed by what he saw and is prepared to make suggestions to Premier Foster regarding improvements which may be made in the educational system of New Brunswick in relation to textbooks and other matters.

On his tour Dr. Carter visited Victoria, Vancouver, Calgary, Regina, Winnipeg, Toronto and Montreal. In Winnipeg he met the superintendent of schools, Dr. McIntyre, formerly of St. John. In Calgary, Dr. A. M. Scott, formerly of the University of New Brunswick, is superintendent of schools and Dr. E. W. Coffin, a former P. E. Island man, is principal of the normal school and in Vancouver Dr. Brydson Jack is actively identified with the school system of that city.

Dr. Carter was much impressed with the school buildings and equipment of the schools. He particularly noticed that the normal schools contained no male students, a fact which would seem to indicate that there will continue to be a drain on eastern Canada for some time to come.

Few More Caves in Which To Hide

Victory Forces Enemy Out Of Holes In The Ridge

Positions Are Outflanked—Laen Menaced and Germans Likely Soon to Retreat to the Frontier

London, Nov. 2.—The significance of last week's great French victory is that the Germans are no longer under cover, and have very few more caves in which to hide.

Laen has been the objective of the French since the enforced retirement of the Germans from the Somme and the Noyon salient last year. They swarmed into the hills north of the ridge of the Chemin des Dames from a point east of Soissons to the neighborhood of Fort Brillet, north of Rheims. They gained the crest of the ridge along the Chemin des Dames from Craonne nearly to Froldmont, and pushed north from Berry-au-Bac to Juvancourt. They forced the Germans out of a position they had maintained south of the river below Vallée from the time of the first Battle of the Aisne in September, 1914.

Then they took Fort Conde, the most southwestern defence of Laen, but were driven up by Royal Marines, just north of the Chemin des Dames. More than a score of counter-attacks on the French have followed this brilliant dash since last April, on the Cernusques and Callornic plateaux, north of Craonne; at the narrow neck of the crest, near St. Regis, between Craonne and the Epine de Chevregny, and at the Moulin de Laffaux, where some of the most sanguinary combats took place. But the French gallantly held all their gains, and by the capture of Malmanson and the villages of Allemans, France, Vandesson are in a position to continue their advance.

They are now looking down upon Laen, which lies about six miles to the north beyond the Ailette River. The Aisne and the Ailette run parallel to each other in this region for about fifteen miles, the latter turning sharply to the north before Chavignon and flowing wide at Hurtebise and at Froldmont. Between these ravines are tongues of land from two to five miles long, stretching down to the Aisne and gradually decreasing in height.

On the northern side of the ridge, descending to the Ailette, there are fewer ravines, and the tongues of land are not more than three-quarters of a mile long between Craonne and Fort Malmanson. Further west the ground is slightly more serrated. The whole region of the Aisne is full of caves like the famous Dragon's Cavern, where so many German soldiers were entrapped a few months ago. The valley of the Ailette is five and a half miles wide and is now fully exposed to French observation and French gunfire along its whole length from the source north of Craonne to the point where the river turns at Chavignon.

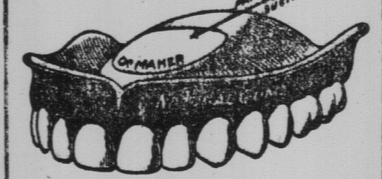
